

**Know what's below.
Call before you dig.**

If you are planning on digging, call Pennsylvania One Call System, Inc. (POCS) three business days before you dig at 1-800-242-1776 or 8-1-1. The call center is open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, every day of the year. PA Act 287 as amended requires excavators as well as private landowners to call POCS three days prior to any type of digging occurring with powered equipment. Mark your excavation area in white paint before calling with a dig notification.

By calling, you allow the facility owners the opportunity to locate and mark their underground facility in advance of the planned excavation (gas and liquid pipelines will mark underground facilities using yellow stakes, flags, or paint).

Welcome New Police Clerk Joanna Vanaman



The Emmaus Community Garden is located off East Main Street, between the Knauss Homestead and the Borough Compost Site. The Community Garden is an environmentally friendly initiative which offers Borough residents, as well as non-residents, the opportunity to plant their own garden and reap the benefits of growing their own produce. The Garden is completely enclosed with a chain link fence, to discourage wildlife from destroying crops. The Garden boasts a total of 55 15' x 30' plots to rent each year. Each gardener is assigned a plot that they are responsible for maintaining. The cost to join this gardening community is \$20.00 for Borough residents and \$35.00 for nonresidents. Curbside Yard Waste Pick-up - Changes to collection*

The Borough's waste hauler, Whitetail Disposal, does not collect yard waste. Yard waste pick-up is available through the Emmaus Public Works Department.

From Monday, April 3rd, 2023 through Monday, October 23rd, 2023, yard waste will be collected by Public Works personnel on ***Mondays*** except holidays (Monday, May 29th and Monday, September 4th - Curbside yard waste will be picked up on Tuesday).



There is a ***5-bag limit*** and yard waste must be placed at the curb in approved yard waste bags. **More than 5 bags will be left at the curb.** The Borough encourages anyone with large quantities of bags to utilize our Compost Site located on Klines Lane.

Yard waste is limited to organic biodegradable materials such as grass, leaves, hedge trimmings, leafy plants and small sticks and twigs. Separate grass, twigs, and hedge trimmings

into different bags. Bags contaminated with stones, trash, mulch, or dirt will not be collected. Material not separated properly will not be collected. **Bags exceeding 50 lbs. will not be collected.**

There are two ways to contact the Borough to have your bags collected.

Please be sure to leave your address and the number of bags. Bags will only be collected for those residents that either call or email. Contact must be made by 11:00 a.m. on the day of pick-up.



Dumpster Day

Refuse and Recycling Information

Refuse and Recycling Can Requirements

In April 2019, the Borough of Emmaus adopted Ordinance No. 1088 which states that “all residential properties utilizing curbside solid waste collection, shall be required to utilize containers that shall be durable, water-tight, and made of metal or plastic. Individual plastic bags and loose waste shall be prohibited from curbside collection. The size of each container shall not exceed a ninety six-gallon capacity.”



Recycling Requirements

RESIDENTS MUST USE A CONTAINER FOR RECYCLABLES. DO NOT PUT YOUR RECYCLABLES IN A BAG! If you need a recycling sticker for your recycling bin, they are available by stopping at Borough Hall, temporarily located at 420 S. 10th Street, Emmaus, PA 18049, Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

In addition, if your recycling is contaminated, or includes items that are not acceptable, according to the list below, all of it will be **REJECTED**. You will receive a sticker from Whitetail detailing the reason why your recycling was rejected. Because of the new recycling requirements at a state, federal, and international level, this policy will be strictly followed.

Single Stream Recycling

- No sorting needed! Everything goes into one container, but please **don't bag your recyclables**. Recycling must be clean and should be loose in your can.

- The following **are acceptable** recyclables

- Paper, cardboard, newspaper, and flat board
- Empty aerosol cans

- Junk mail, manila & brown folders, glossy & colored inserts
- Magazines & Telephone books
- Bi metal

- Tin
- Steel containers and aluminum cans
- Glass bottles & Jars
- Plastics #1-7

Whitetail does not accept demolition or construction material including drywall, bricks, lumber, or shingles, hazardous waste including radioactive, reactive, toxic, ignitable, corrosive, pathological, or acidic, and tires.

Refuse/Recycling Holiday Schedule 2023

Thanksgiving Day – Thursday, November 23rd - Whitetail Disposal will be closed on Thanksgiving Day. Thursday and Friday service days will be delayed by one day. Normal Thursday service will occur on Friday, and normal Friday service will occur on Saturday. * Wednesday service day will remain unaffected. *

*Please place materials curbside the night prior to your service day so we may guarantee collection



E-Waste Recycling

Whitetail Disposal provides a 30-yard container at **33 Klines Lane, March through November**, specifically for E-Waste collection. The E-Waste Dumpster is available on the **2nd Monday of the month** from Noon until the dumpster is full. The site is closed from December through February.

Whitetail Disposal employees provides manpower to assist residents with disposal of these items.

Guidelines for dropping off items:

- Items will only be accepted on designated days during designated hours.
- Residents visiting the site shall show the attendant their identification signifying that they are a Borough resident. Items from outside the Borough of Emmaus will not be accepted.
- Residents can drop off three electronic devices at no charge, with a maximum of 2 TV's per resident. Exceeding three electronic devices being dropped off in a single month by a resident or business within the Borough of Emmaus will cost an additional \$10.00 per item.

• NO HAZARDOUS MATERIALS ARE ACCEPTED.

Bulk Items – You must contact Whitetail Disposal for all bulk item pick-ups.

- Please call Whitetail Disposal at 610-936-9967 for any questions or concerns on bulk items and to arrange a pick-up. One bulk item per week will be collected.
- To arrange a pickup contact Whitetail Disposal no less than 24 hours **PRIOR** to your regular pick-up day. Identify yourself as a Borough of Emmaus resident. Whitetail Disposal will instruct you on collection of your item(s).
- Each Bulk item is limited to no more than **70 LBS.**
- **Mattresses and box springs must be wrapped in plastic. Toilets must be bagged.**
- Construction materials will **NOT** be collected.
- Appliances containing Freon will **NOT** be collected.





Colonial Educational Project at the Shelter House

To enhance the latest colonial exhibition display at The Shelter House, we are introducing our most recent project, the "jamb stove."



A jamb stove is described as a rectangular box made up of five iron plates to form a cube with an open back. A jamb stove was a source of heat in the early colonial log structures which had little or no insulation. The jamb stove was used from the early 1700's to around 1780's. There is evidence in the fireplace at Shelter House that a jamb stove had been used at one time.

According to Ken Biles, master of this project, "On average it would measure 22"x20"x20". It was located on the opposite side of the kitchen fireplace wall with a hole in the back wall of the fireplace

to allow hot coals from the fireplace to be shoveled into the rear opening of the jamb stove. It vented through the fireplace chimney."

What is so fascinating about the colonial jamb stove is that iron masters would create their own designs for the jamb stoves that they crafted. Designs might be the early Germanic motif, such as the well-known thistle finch, tulip or stylized floral motifs, or individual designs created by the iron master. Sometimes the homeowner who commissioned the jamb stove would insist on his own design or signature. Ken Biles will design the motif for the Shelter House jamb stove.

Examples of this beautiful iron work may be seen at the Mercer Museum in Doylestown, PA, The Philadelphia Museum of Art, The Barnes Collection, and many other museums all over the country.

Watch for news of the unveiling of the jamb stove at Shelter House.

A cozy place to start seeds is on top of your refrigerator.

A shrub purchased when it is 12 inches could easily turn into a 12 foot monster. Put that in your sunny border and before you know it, you could have a shade garden. Prior to planting anything in your yard, check out your neighbor's yard. A young tree could shade out your vegetable garden in a few short years.



Tired of those teeny ants that show up every spring? Sprinkle talcum powder around the baseboards where you notice them. They will NOT cross that powder. Tried and true!!

"Now here we build a village small; toward its mission we give all; Here too, our hearts within shall flame-Emmaus shall be its name."

The picture at right is of the 1803 house constructed by Jacob Ehrenhardt, Jr. It shows the condition of the house after it was vacated and before it completely deteriorated. The house was constructed on land owned by his parents. His father, Jacob Ehrenhardt, Sr., constructed the home on Lot 1 of the Moravian Village which is now known as 150 Main Street. Jacob Ehrenhardt Senior was one of the founders of the village and this is why we as Friends of the 1803 House are enthusiastic to learn about the development of this historic site.

Jacob Ehrenhardt, Jr was born in the year 1760, the same year that his father died. The village helped raise Jacob Ehrenhardt's, as his mother died when he was 17. Jacob became a shoemaker, farmer, soldier, and entrepreneur. He married and he and his wife raised 4 daughters. The Ehrenhardt's built a beautiful Pennsylvania Farmhouse using local fieldstone, bricks, and wood. The house is facing the West so that he could see the house that he was born in.

The Friends of the 1803 House was formed in 1975 after the Borough purchased the property from Rodale. With the generosity of the community and Rodale, the 1803 House has been restored. The Friends of the 1803 House restore, maintain, and occupy the house for the purpose of telling the story of Emmaus, Pennsylvania. It is a perfect place to share the history of Emmaus, Pennsylvania. There is a lot more work to do on the house and a lot of financial support and volunteers are needed to accomplish this. The Friends of the 1803 House have been restoring this historic structure for 48 years. We thank the Borough, the financial contributors, and volunteers for supporting the restoration efforts. Over \$200,000 has been donated or received from special events over the years.

There is no better way to tell the story of Emmaus, PA "our village small". The Borough owns two other historic properties, the Shelter House and the Knauss Homestead. They have the same mission, to tell the story of Emmaus, Pennsylvania. Be sure to visit all three historic properties in 2023 and learn more about the history of Emmaus. 

Knauss Homestead Preservation Society

As with all things in life there is a beginning and an end and so it is when seeking direction.

All map applications will ask for a starting and ending location for your destination. Your history, your beginning is just as important as your place now. Who came before you? What trials and tribulations did they endure, as well as those that followed in their footsteps, that has played a role in shaping who you are?

The Knauss Homestead, long one of the best kept secrets in Emmaus, is endeavoring to provide that information to all the descendants that have followed in the footsteps of Ludwig Knauss, ancestor of the Knauss family who arrived on these shores 300 years ago this year with his family including sons, Sebastian, one of the founding fathers of Emmaus and brother Johannes. Their arrival here in the valley created the foundation for the village of your hometown, Emmaus.



The Knauss Homestead is developing a comprehensive genealogy link on its website that will allow visitors a glimpse of their past. Currently a "history blog" is up and running which takes the visitor on a short journey through all the occupants on the Knauss Homestead, starting in 1777 with Heinrich Knauss, son of Sebastian and continuing for 158 consecutive years of Knauss occupancy. The story does not simply start and stop there, for Emmaus in its early years was a unique village, closed to all but those of the Moravian faith and the Emmaus



Moravian Church. As such, marriages were only allowed between those of the congregation resulting in most members of the village being related to the founding fathers. The Knauss Homestead will also share a large collection of old photos recently received of early Knauss family members. The Knauss Homestead invites you to share in this unique experience and share with us any pictures that depict the early years of Emmaus, or the homestead, so that we may take everyone on a journey through time of our precious little village.





EMMAUS FIRE DEPARTMENT 2022 Year in Action



Explaining Recent Rate Increases

If you didn't already read about it, we're sure you've seen that some of your bills from the Borough have increased this year. While the decisions weren't easy for Borough Council during budget discussions, the purposes for the increases were necessary. An explanation of the increases can be found below.

Water Rates Increased to Address PFAS and Holding Tanks

As you are aware, the Borough is currently pursuing a DEP-approved remedy to mitigate the PFAS in our drinking water in Wells #1 and #2. As we are wrapping up the mandated feasibility study, we are finding that costs could range anywhere from approximately \$2 million to \$6 million depending on the option that is selected.

In addition to the PFAS mitigation issue, the Borough is also in need of repairing our water holding tanks, including several significant repairs to our large holding tanks on S. 5th Street as well as one of our smaller holding tanks in the Borough. The projected cost to repair the tanks is \$1.9 million. If we do not repair the tanks, the cost to replace them is \$4 million for a smaller tank and \$10 million for each of the large holding tanks. By repairing the tanks in their current state, we will be able to preserve the tanks for approximately an additional 50 years. However, by continuing to allow them to weather and deteriorate, we would be eventually forced to completely replace the tanks, per a recent inspection conducted by Utility Service Company, Inc. We have applied for a grant for the tank rehabilitation, and we will be applying for grants for the PFAS mitigation, however, we cannot be certain that we will receive grant funding, as several hundred municipalities are applying for the same pot of funding.

Due to these very significant issues and the associated costs, Borough Council was forced to reexamine water and sewer rates. The Borough instituted a Water Infrastructure Account and increased usage rates for all users to assist with funding the capital costs of the projects and ongoing associated costs. It is estimated that a household of 4 in the Borough will incur additional water usage costs, on average, of about \$41.60 per year as well as a \$60.00 infrastructure fee.

Sewer Rate Increases to Address Ongoing Stormwater Issues

Much like water, the Borough has significant sewer issues that must be addressed. As has been discussed many times in previous newsletters, the Borough is mandated by PA DEP to separate stormwater out of the sewer system. While we have been working very diligently on this project, we still have a lot of work to do. Sewer Rates are increasing because of the continued effort to remove storm water from the sewer system. We are under a mandate to do this, and with the upcoming assessment of the entire system, if the Borough does not improve the percentage of water hitting the sewer during a storm, we are going to be required to pay a greater percentage to the upgrades at the Allentown Klines Island Sewer Plant. We have been informed that our system, based on percentage, puts the rawest water into the sewer system during a storm event. The Borough is preparing to borrow \$4 million to continue to address improving sewer mains and manholes to reduce the amount of water entering the system. This is a federal and state mandate.

In addition to this, the Lehigh County Authority (LCA), has been working to conduct a full study of the current capacity of the sewer plant and the capital infrastructure that is needed to bring the plant into full compliance, allowing for the proper amount of capacity without dumping water into the Lehigh River. There are several major upgrades that are most likely going to occur at the sewer plant at Klines Island. The first set of projects are estimated to cost about \$32.5 million, and will include a boiler replacement, substation upgrades, pump station

improvements, and other major infrastructure improvements. The Borough of Emmaus will be responsible for about 3.5% of the costs of the project, or about \$1.2 million. If we were to finance the costs through 2055, our total cost for these upgrades would reach about \$2.4 million. In addition to this, we are working collaboratively with LCA, Allentown, and all the other municipalities that send sewage to the Allentown Sewer Plant. There is a much larger, more robust project that could be a result of the ongoing need to address the infrastructure. It is currently being proposed that our percentage of payment to this project would be based on a raw percentage of additional flow sent to the sewer plant during rainstorm events. Based on our current averages, our portion could increase from 3.5% to nearly 11%. The overall project could cost over \$200 million to improve the sewer plant. This is why we continue to work diligently to remove the stormwater out of the sewer.

Rates per 1,000 gallons will be increasing from \$2.80 per 1,000 gallons to \$3.75 per 1,000 gallons. A typical household of 4 uses 16,000 gallons per quarter. The increase will be, on average, \$15.20 per quarter, or \$60.80 per year for a family of 4.

Property Taxes – New Taxes Added to Improve Streets

The Borough is not increasing the General Fund Property Tax, or the Fire Fund Property Tax for 2023, however, we have created two new taxes to address the significant street issues that we have.

The biggest complaint the Borough has heard for many years is regarding the condition of our streets and lack of repairs. The Borough has spent the past several years formulating a long-term plan to improve Borough streets. As part of that plan, we need to fund the much-needed improvements. To do that, the Borough created two taxes. The first is a street light tax. While this may not seem like it has anything to do with roads, we currently pay for streetlighting out of our Liquid Fuels Fund money. That fund is specifically designed for expenses relating to roads. By creating the tax and paying for streetlights out of the fund which they should be paid, this will free up \$120,000 per year for road work.

In addition to this, the Borough created a Special Road Project Tax, which is a specific tax for nothing but road work. The tax will generate approximately \$250,000 per year specifically for street work in the Borough. This means that the Borough will have about \$300,000 - \$400,000 per year for dedicated street improvement work moving forward. Historically, we have only been able to budget about \$100,000 per year. Because of this, it would take multiple years to save to complete a sizable project. For the sake of discussing costs, the Borough received a \$575,000 grant to reconstruct a ½ mile section of S. 2nd Street next year. The project cost is estimated to cost about \$850,000 for a half mile of road (about the equivalent of 6 – 7 blocks of street). By formulating a long-term plan and having a dedicated funding source, the Borough can now begin to be more proactive in different types of road maintenance efforts, such as micro-surfacing some roads, while reconstructing others, chip and sealing some, and crack sealing others, all in the same year, rather than saving for years to do one single road and continuing to allow others to fall into more disrepair. This does not mean that the streets will be fixed overnight, however, it puts us on a more progressive path to address the issues we have. We will discuss some of our major projects for 2023 in another article in the newsletter.

Based on a house assessed at \$200,000, the new Street Lighting Tax of 0.15 mills will cost \$29.93 per year. The new Special Roads Fund Tax of 0.32 mills will cost \$64.00 per year. The total tax bill for a house assessed at \$200,000 will be \$1,606.92 at face value and \$1,512.99 if paid in the discount period.

We continue to write in the newsletter regarding our status with PFAS and the “forever chemicals”. If you’ve been paying attention to the news lately, there are more and more articles hitting the newsstands relating to PFAS. Most recently, scientists at the Environmental Working Group (EWG) released findings regarding data collected from 2013 – 2015 from the US EPA on more than 500 freshwater fish across the nation. They found an average of 9.5 points per billion (ppb) PFAS in fish from US rivers and streams and 11.9 parts per billion in fish from the Great Lakes. Remember, they are measuring in parts per billion, while our water is measuring in parts per trillion. Articles are saying that we should only eat one or two fresh water (non-commercial) fish per year now. While we can’t confirm this, we recommend you read up on this, especially if you are a fisherman. There are other recent articles relating to PFAS being found in undergarments and levels found in rainwater across the world. On January 16, 2023, the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania released the newest “acceptable” levels of PFAS in drinking water. They lowered the acceptable level of PFOS to 14 parts per trillion (ppt) and PFOA at 18 parts per trillion. This is much lower than the previous level of a combined 70 ppt.

How does this reduction in the “acceptable” PFAS level affect what we are doing to mitigate our current issues? The answer is that it doesn’t affect our current efforts at all regarding Well #1 and Well #2. By the time this newsletter reaches your doorstep, our feasibility study with DEP will be completed and we should be on our way to selecting the most feasible mitigation option to reduce our levels. Throughout the entire process working with potential vendors, we have required all mitigation models to be built to reduce PFAS levels down to an undetectable level. Considering we need to reach that point while pumping water out of two wells at a combined rate of 1,100 gallons per minute, this has been quite a task for prospective treatment options. In fact, at least one potential vendor has informed us that their model cannot reach that level given the amount of water. However, several other potential treatment options can reach an undetectable level. Treatment options are estimated to cost between \$2 million and \$3 million in upfront capital costs, with yearly maintenance costs.

We have previously discussed some of the different options we have been exploring in our feasibility study. We have explored the feasibility of digging a new well somewhere in the Borough. Test digging will cost several hundred thousand dollars. Our hydrologists fear the possibility that the well could pull from the same plume of water that is already contaminated. They do not recommend this option. Moreover, construction of a new well and holding tanks could reach around \$5 million. We have also examined the possibility of tapping into the City of Allentown’s water system and contracting the City to either fully purchase our water from them or purchase enough to supplement our system. Although we don’t have the exact amount, this cost could reach between \$5 million and \$10 million depending on the entry point into the borough, as our hydrologists are telling us that our piping is not sized to bring in water from the City. Therefore, we would have to reconstruct somewhere between 5,000 lf and 10,000 lf of water pipe, would need to build a pump station, and would need other significant infrastructure to be able to do this. There are both advantages and disadvantages to

exploring this option. As we previously stated, we are not allowed to shut down both wells without the addition of another water source, as we cannot produce enough water to supply the community, therefore, the option of simply shutting off the second well is not a feasible option. The last set of options include different treatment methods. We have received the last set of calculations from different perspective treatment vendors and our hydrologists have analyzed the results. Any treatment option that could be selected will cost no less than \$2 million and probably closer to \$3 million in installation and infrastructure costs. The costs continue to increase, as the system needs to be designed to mitigate the PFAS levels down to undetectable levels, and added infrastructure is needed to maintain water pressure and to treat current chemicals that are already being treated. One of the concerns that we must take into consideration, however, is any residual chemicals that might be produced, how the treatment affects the rest of the chemical equation, and if there is any discharge into the sewer system, as there is a potential that the waste could be considered hazardous waste, which could be costly itself. There are chemical equations and calculations that are ongoing that will be included in the feasibility study to address these concerns. With a treatment system in place, there would be ongoing maintenance costs of up to approximately \$100,000 per year, as resin beds or carbon beds would need to be changed periodically to continue the assurance that PFAS levels remain undetectable. Because of the amount of water pushing through the wells, this could occur several times per year, pushing the maintenance costs higher.

Our latest PFAS testing results from November 16, 2022 showed that both Well #1 and Well #2 experienced reductions in combined PFAS levels. Well #1 tested at 18 ppt for PFOA and 110 ppt for PFOS, for a combined 118 ppt. Well #2 tested at 92 ppt for PFOS and 970 ppt for PFOA, for a combined 1,062 parts per trillion. In August, the levels were 232 ppt in Well #1 and 1,560 ppt in Well #2. While both readings are an improvement, both are unacceptable and much higher than the “acceptable” standards.

We truly do appreciate the community’s patience regarding this, as we are working every day to try to expedite remediation. Unfortunately, it’s not as easy as simply applying a filter to our system, otherwise, we would have done this already. Once the study is submitted and approved by PA DEP, we will apply for a permit through DEP and will either order the treatment system or move forward with one of the other alternatives as quickly as possible. We will also be applying for grant funding through PENNVEST and other opportunities to try to offset the costs of this very serious and important endeavor. We will continue to update you as more information is available. Our plan, once the feasibility is completed (which will be prior to this newsletter release) is to have a public meeting with our consultant to present each of the different options in the study. We will ask for community feedback prior to Council deciding. The process will occur fairly quickly, as there are a lot of moving parts, a long lead-time for delivery, construction, and installation, and a need to expedite as quickly as possible. If you have any questions, please feel free to reach out to the Borough Manager.

Continuing and Preparing for More Progress

While we have always considered our wonderful Borough a progressive community, we never truly had a long-term plan for the community. Through an initiative by the Emmaus Planning Commission, Emmaus Borough Council, Borough staff, and several committees of volunteers throughout the community, the Borough has teamed with consultants to formulate a series of studies and plans for different operations over the past several years. Several years ago, the Borough participated in a multi-municipal Comprehensive Plan. From that comprehensive plan, the Emmaus Planning Commission was challenged with the task of creating a viable visioning plan to assist the Borough in implementing. The Commission created a committee of volunteer stakeholders from different sectors throughout the Borough. The committee spent nearly two years creating the Visioning Plan for the Borough, attempting to tackle many of the different areas of focus and needs for the community. Moreover, the Borough received several grants to fund several parks and recreation plans, including a Master Parks and Recreation Plan, a comprehensive trail and greenway plan, and Master Site Plans for Boroline Park and Lions Playground. The Borough also conducted a feasibility study and master plan for the Community Park swimming pool. Lastly, the Borough is in the process of completing the overhaul of our Zoning Ordinance, Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance, and Official Map in hopes of bringing our regulations into current times and helping to plan for the future of the community.

In conjunction with all the plans, Borough Council and our various departments have worked on a 5-year operations and capital plan to begin the execution of our long-term visions and goals that were laid out in the plans. We are excited to share some of the upcoming projects with you, although this certainly is not a comprehensive list.

— New Ambulance Coming Soon and Specs for New Fire Apparatus to Begin —

The Borough has 3 ambulances. We rotate 1 ambulance out every 4 years, meaning the lifespan of an ambulance is about 12 years in the Borough. We ordered our newest ambulance at the end of the Summer in 2021. We are finally scheduled to receive the new ambulance in July 2023. The backlog on orders is two years! Because of this backlog of two or more years on emergency vehicles, our Fire Department will soon begin working on specifications to replace our Rescue Truck.



Parking Kiosk Coming Soon

The Borough recently entered into a lease agreement to rent the parking lot adjacent to Buss Paints and Armetta's (the old Wells Fargo parking lot). The Borough will be installing a pay to park kiosk in the lot by early Spring. We will release more details as they are made available, as we have not finalized them as of the writing of this article. It is anticipated that there will be hourly parking available, and a limited number of monthly parking permits available at the lot. The kiosk will be a touch screen, where you can pay by coin or with credit card, through text and through an App.

A Renewed Focus on Street Work

We hear you! The # 1 complaint we receive in the Borough is regarding the condition of our streets. The Borough has taken a much more proactive approach to repairing our streets. We recently conducted a street conditions study through a 3rd party vendor. The study rated each street and helped lay out an improvement plan for each street with projected possible budgets. We understand that there are many streets in bad condition, however, we do not have unlimited funds and resources. Therefore, we are trying to lay out a plan to reconstruct the worst streets and try to lengthen the lifespan of others before they get to the point of needing to be reconstructed. This includes a blended method of reconstruction of some streets, milling and paving on others, and oil and chip on those that still have some lifespan left that could be extended. In addition, the department has increased its efforts for fog sealing and crack sealing streets as well.

Our Public Works Director, Lawrence Carl, recently submitted a 10-year highway plan based on the assessments to Borough Council. For the next two years, there are plans to address several immediate needs in the community. We are certain that your street may not be on "the list", however, we are working to address the most immediate needs as quickly as possible in the plan.

In future years, the Borough plans to notify residents that need to repair their curbs and sidewalks adjacent to roads that will be reconstructed, as per Ordinance. We will notify residents no less than 1 year out. Our goal will be to notify individuals two years in advance of the project.

Please note that the current projects may change depending on actual costs, resources, and schedule changes.

2023 Projects:

- S. 2nd Street. The Borough received a \$575,000 grant to complete this project. It is a ½ mile stretch from Main Street to the Borough line. The projected cost of the project is \$850,000. We have been saving Liquid Fuels funds for 3 years to cover the remainder of the project cost. UGI work is also projected to occur on this section of street. As of now, UGI is projected to complete their work in late Spring and early Summer. The Borough projects to work on our project in the Fall. The project also includes addressing some stormwater issues, ADA curb ramps, and creating a walking connection under the railroad overpass.
- Banner Street – about 176 lf – reconstruction – cost \$29,000.
- Fernwood Street (Alpine to Mountain) reconstruction – cost \$169,000.

Much-Needed Updates to Borough Buildings

The Borough Hall, Central Station, and Police Station construction projects are ongoing. The contractor, Skepton Construction, projects that the completion of construction will be in July. Borough Hall had significant utility issues, including poor electric, no heating system, asbestos abatement, mold removal in the basement, a leaking roof, ADA issues, basement flooding, and major plumbing issues. These mitigation efforts were required prior to any efficiency or other safety improvements being made. The remodeled building will include new offices and a conference room in the basement of the building for the Codes Department, elevator access from the entrance door to the building, a singular main entrance from Jubilee Street, remodeled Council Chambers, the tax collector's office being moved to the main floor, and other efficiency improvements. The old garage is also being remodeled to include a new public conference room and additional police storage in the rear. A new garage was added to the back of the building for police cars and the codes vehicles.

Central Station is receiving a major overhaul, including a 3,600 sq. ft addition. The inside of the building is being completely remodeled to bring the building up to code for 24/7 paid emergency services. When the building was first built in 1980, it was designed for a volunteer ambulance and fire department that wasn't staffed around the clock. The building does not meet ADA requirements, nor does it meet HIPAA requirements for record keeping, report making, and other legally required actions associated with patient care, such as proper storage areas for medicines. While the Ambulance Department certainly did a very good job in keeping all of these items secure, the building itself wasn't suited for us to be able to be in complete compliance. For example, the station was an election poll site. To come into the building, individuals needed to pass by 2 offices just inside the front door that really should have been secured. If an individual needed to use the restroom, they passed by the medicine area, the records keeping area, and the report-writing area. All these concerns have been addressed in the new layout of the building.

At the Police Station, there is a serious need to expand the evidence room area. This is because in certain cases, we must keep the evidence for up to 99 years, as required by law. We must keep confiscated weapons and drugs until a judge can sign off on a court order to destroy them. This can take years to do depending on the case and the amount of evidence that is stored. The continuous compilation of evidence has clogged the current evidence room to the point that we need to expand the area. To accomplish this, there are some other efficiency changes that will need to be made to the building, as well as expanding some HVAC piping to ensure proper ventilation of the new evidence area.

In addition to the improvements of these three buildings, the Borough is working to continue to work on other facilities in the Borough. The relatively new Public Works Garage is in line to receive a few upgrades, including insulation and door openers. In the near future, the Borough will be working to consider redesigning one of the public works garages, as it is facing the need to replace the entire roof and is in need of other major repairs. We will examine the cost and efficiency feasibility of replacing the building instead.



We are also in the process of making site improvements at the Compost Site to make the area more secure and more efficient. We are relocating some areas to make the drop-off and pick-up processes smoother for our citizens. In addition, we will also be installing surveillance cameras around all our public work's buildings and in the compost area, as there continues to be illegal dumping and other activity at the sites.



Park Improvements on the Horizon!

As we completed our Park Studies, it was evident that most members of our community are heavy users of our recreational offerings. It was also evident in our surveys that our residents want to see our facilities updated and improved. In the past, parks were among the first thing that were cut when budgets were tight. However, Borough Council has clearly heard our citizens and have recognized that we need to make sure that our park and recreation systems continue to be among the best in the area. We have made a concerted effort to ensure that development recreation fees are dedicated to the park closest to the development. That has assisted in allowing the Borough to dedicate funds to parks and projects that were previously were unable to fund. In addition, we have received a \$318,000 grant for the reconstruction of Lions Playground, based on the Master Site Plan that the community assisted in designing. Moreover, Council has dedicated more funding to our recreational offerings over the past few years as well, including new amenities at the pool, and the installation of some new equipment. Here is what we are planning to do in 2023.

- Arch Street Park – the Borough received \$23,000 for improvements to the Arch Street Park. This included a donation from Valley Builders as well as some other development fees. Improvements will include the installation of a small playset system and repairs to the park.
- Furnace Dam Park – the Borough received approximately \$128,000 from Phoebe in fees for their independent living facility. The Borough is going to complete Phase 2 of the dam engineering assessment. In addition, the Borough will be installing a bocce ball court and a pickleball court at the park this year.
- Snack Stand Improvements – the snack stand continues to offer more and more to our park patrons. To keep the stand up to code, improvements such as a new hood system, sink, and ADA compliance issues need to be addressed this year. We are also exploring an option to allow parents to put credit on their child's season pass to allow them to use for food purchases in the future.
- Swimming Pool Improvements – if you visited the pool in 2022, you noticed significant amenity improvements, including a climbing wall, sliding board, zip line, and basketball hoops. We will continue to improve the pool this year with some repairs to our bath houses. Additionally, we are excited that our new pool manager, Tiffany Reed, will be leading the way in brand new, exciting programming this year. More to come regarding the pool this year!
- Pavilion Tables and Trash Receptacles – we are beginning a replacement program of picnic tables and trash receptacles in our parks. This year, we will address at least, upgrading the tables as well as the receptacles at one pavilion.
- Triangle Park Tables – we love the artistic tables that the Arts Commission placed in the park. We recently received a grant from the Lehigh Valley Chamber Foundation for several permanent tables, including at least one ADA table in the park in 2023.
- S. 4th Street Drainage – the back baseball field at the park floods every time it rains because the swale has filled in over the years. The borough will be digging the swale out in hopes that we can make the field more usable for organizations in the future.
- Lions Playground – the most exciting project that we have going this year is the parks and recreation world is at Lions Playground. We received a \$318,000 grant for the park. There is a 50/50 match for the project. Some of the match is from recreation fees from a nearby development project. The project is going to include reconstructing the baseball field, installing a new playground, installing bathrooms, installing a walking path and landscaping, and possibly, in the future, installing a splash pad at the park. The project will be done in phases, however, planning and some construction will occur later this year. The construction project will be based on the master site plan that was conducted for the park.

NEW ZONING ORDINANCE, SALDO, and OFFICIAL MAP NEARLY COMPLETED

The Borough has spent the last year working with Michael Baker, International (MBI) to update our outdated Zoning and SALDO Ordinances, and to establish an Official Map for the Borough.

New Zoning Ordinance

30 years ago, in 1993, the Borough adopted its most recent Zoning Ordinance. Since then, Emmaus has changed. In 2017 the Borough cooperated with its neighbors in Alburtis, Lower Macungie, Macungie, and Upper and Lower Milford to adopt a coordinated multi-municipal comprehensive plan. Also, the Emmaus Planning Commission and the Community Relations, Planning and Development Committee completed the Emmaus Visioning Plan. The new Zoning Ordinance will reflect these plans.

Form-Based Zoning

With the adoption of this new Zoning Ordinance, Emmaus will be the first community in the Lehigh Valley to adopt a form-based Zoning Ordinance for its entire municipality. A form-based Zoning Ordinance ensures that new development and redevelopment blends into the look and feel of each existing neighborhood.

How Will the Zoning Ordinance Change?

All the zoning districts will change, and the draft zoning map shown below depicts the possible boundaries of the new zoning districts. Borough staff and community volunteers have worked for over a year with a consultant to ensure that the district boundaries and the regulations for each district match the existing character of each neighborhood. Additionally, the public contributed many suggestions on the Borough website and at community events held in 2022. Before Borough Council adopts the new Zoning Ordinance, the Borough will hold a public comment period to ensure that all property owners can see what the new provisions will mean for them. Existing, lawful structures and uses already in place will be allowed to continue unchanged. However, new development will conform to the new Zoning Ordinance.

The Zoning Hearing Board

Property owners who would like to request a variance, or a waiver, from a zoning ordinance provision must appeal to the Zoning Hearing Board. The Zoning Hearing Board forms a quasi-judicial body which handles these legally intricate situations. The Borough incurs significant costs when an applicant appeals to the Zoning Hearing Board, so, in 2023, the fees to appear before the Board increased. The good news is that most zoning permits do not require an appeal to the Zoning Hearing Board. The Zoning Officer routinely reviews permit applications for fences, decks, sheds, garages, driveways, pools, signs, home occupations, property uses, and other forms of development to confirm that a proposed change complies with the provisions allowed by the Borough's Zoning Ordinance. Ordinary zoning permit fees have not changed, and these remain very low. Many residents find it helpful to meet with the Zoning Officer the first time they fill out a zoning permit application for many reasons. For instance, many first-time applicants learn from the Zoning Officer which zoning district their property sits in and the regulations for their zoning district. To

SALDO Ordinance


The Borough's Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance (SALDO) was first written in 1976 and has been amended periodically since. The Ordinance governs the development of property within the Borough, establishing regulations for subdivisions, new construction, and larger additions to properties. The Ordinance in its current form has provided challenges for meeting current standards and trends in today's society, as well as the wants and needs of families and developers trying to build to outdated standards. The new Ordinance will bring those standards up to date.

Official Map

An Official Map is a land-use planning tool authorized by the Pennsylvania Municipalities Planning Code. It is a way for the Borough to comprehensively examine the municipality and identify properties that could be beneficial for future public use and a way to preserve current properties in the future. The map is a means for the Borough's intentions to be clearly stated so that property owners are fully aware if there is a potential future interest in their parcel, as well as to clearly establish the future use intentions of publicly owned parcels.

What are the Next Steps in the Process?

The Borough's consultant, MBI, has been working with Borough staff as well as a committee of volunteers within the community to create proposed drafts. They have based the Ordinances and Official Map off the Comprehensive Plan, as well as the recently completed Visioning Plan that a volunteer committee completed over a three-year span. Over the next several months, the documents will be completed and will be ready for public review. Public Meetings and a Public Hearing will be held regarding each of the Ordinances as well as the Official Map. Public input on the proposed Ordinances will be encouraged, as the intention is for these Ordinances to help govern future development and redevelopment in the Borough for the next several decades. Be on the lookout for the upcoming public meetings and proposed documents.



Shade Tree Commission in Urgent Need of Volunteers

What We Do: We collaborate with the Public Works Department and Borough Managers to ensure aging and declining street trees are removed and replaced with suitable species.

The Shade Tree Commission drafted a comprehensive street tree plan (covering Main and Chestnut Streets downtown), which Borough Council approved in 2019. Our job now is to implement that plan. Each year we create a priority list of trees to replace, order trees from a local supplier, and coordinate removal and planting with Borough employees. We also issue permits to residents seeking to prune or remove trees located on private property within the public right-of-way (12 feet of the curb).

Who We are Looking For: Anyone who loves trees, wants to ensure our downtown streets remain beautifully tree-lined, and can spare 1 hour per month for meetings.

When & Where We Meet: The third Tuesday of each month, 5:00-6:00 p.m. at Borough Hall (temporarily located at 420 S. 10th St.).

If you're not available on Tuesdays, apply anyway! We are flexible and would be willing to find a time that accommodates all members' schedules.




