

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THE HALLOWEEN PARADE: AN EMMAUS TRADITION

JOIN US FOR THE EMMAUS HALLOWEEN PARADE - OCTOBER 21st

It will be a Spooktacular event!



The Emmaus Halloween Parade is scheduled for Saturday, October 21st, 2023, at 7:00 p.m., with a rain date of Sunday, October 22nd at 6:30 p.m. All entrants must be registered for the parade. Registration forms are available on the Borough website (www.emmauspa.gov) or the parade website (www.emmausparade.com). The deadline for registration is October 9th, 2023.



Additional Parade Information: Participants will be notified the week of the parade about assigned divisions and reporting locations. **MAKE SURE EVERYONE IN YOUR GROUP KNOWS WHERE AND WHEN TO REPORT!** Division captains in orange vests will guide you to your assigned location.

PRIZES – Entrants must complete the parade route to be eligible for prizes. Group prizes are awarded to groups of eight or more. Prize money must be picked up immediately following the parade at the Williams Street ball field located at the intersection of Williams and Ridge Streets.

The Halloween Parade Committee needs more volunteers so traditions like the Parade can continue to grow!



Volunteer positions needed:

Division Captain – Formats the division and walks with the parade to keep it secure and orderly. 5:30 p.m. until the parade ends. The parade needs eight to ten Division Captains.

Parade Marshal – Formats the parade, attends weekly meetings, and weaves the Parade in Formation Area. 5:30 p.m. until the parade ends.

Float Formation Area – Lines up all the floats according to the parade format. 5:00 p.m. until the parade starts. The parade needs four to six volunteers for the Float Formation Area.



Rules and Regulations:

The following rules and regulations will provide safety to all participants and spectators.

1. No drilling or exhibition of any type is permitted.
2. No bicycles, skateboards, roller blades, scooters, or motorcycles,

3. No licensed vehicles unless fully decorated in a Halloween theme or pulling a float.
4. No open fires, fireworks, or alcoholic beverages.
5. Throwing or projecting anything, including candy, silly string, or coins, will not be tolerated. The handing out of candy is permitted but PLEASE DO NOT throw the candy from floats or vehicles!
6. No business or political advertising.
7. A concession permit is required for anyone selling anything along the parade route, including outside sales by stores at fixed locations.



Halloween Parade Committee Meetings are held every Wednesday at 7:00 p.m., starting September 13th. (The last meeting will be held on Thursday, October 19th at 6:30 p.m.) Meetings will be held in the Community Room at Town Hall, 28 S. 4th Street, Emmaus.

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

Emmaus Community Garden Completing Another Successful Season



The 2023 growing season will soon come to an end at the Emmaus Community Garden. Once again, all 56 plots were busy producing fresh, organic vegetables and fruit for area gardeners. Community Garden Commission members and volunteers continued maintaining a plot with tomatoes, peppers, squash, and other vegetables for the Plant-a-Row program, benefiting Lehigh County food banks. After a late and surprising frost, other gardeners raised everything from plump pumpkins to bouquets of basil, pounds of potatoes to bountiful beans within their 15' x 30' plots.

EARTH DAY CLEAN UP – 2023

On April 23, 2023, the Joint Environmental Advisory Council of the Borough of Emmaus and Upper Milford Township hosted its annual Earth Day cleanup. There were an estimated 97 volunteers who helped clear debris and litter in areas of Emmaus and Upper Milford Township.



The Borough of Emmaus and Upper Milford Township both provided Public Works employees who helped to set up the event, collect, and dispose of materials that were gathered. The total volume of debris and litter collected was: 67 (30 Gallon bags) of trash, 19 (30 Gallon bags) of recyclables, 10,885 lbs. of electronic waste, 2,011 lbs. of paper, a picnic table, and a hub cap.

The Environmental Advisory Council and everyone involved is very proud of this annual event. It was a huge success and continues to be a great tribute to community involvement and environmental awareness.

Volunteer Opportunities

The Borough of Emmaus has openings on several Boards and Commissions. If you would like to be part of the process and volunteer for the community, we encourage you to explore one of these opportunities:

Emmaus Arts Commission – 5 vacancies: This Commission explores different artistic opportunities in the community and sponsors many of our wonderful community events. Joint Environmental Advisory Commission – 2 vacancies: This Advisory Council is a joint board with Upper Milford Township and the Borough of Emmaus. The Council oversees several events and projects throughout the year, including Earth Day, public education events, and different environmental projects such as stream bank restoration work along our creeks. Time Commitment: One meeting per month in either Emmaus Borough or Upper Milford Township.

Recreation and Entertainment Commission

6 vacancies: This Commission oversees a variety of community events and activities. The Commission oversees the Summer Concert Series, Movies in the Park, and events like car shows, Community Day, and others that the Commission decides to host throughout the year.

Preferred Experience / Qualifications: event planning, parks and recreational professional, attends community events, fundraising experience.

Time Commitment: minimum of one 1-hour meeting per month. During spring, summer, and early fall, time commitment will be more.




Volunteers of the Year Announced for 2021 and 2022

Each year Borough Council honors our volunteers. The Emmaus Borough Volunteer of the Year Award was created to recognize an outstanding community volunteer whose unselfish and dedicated service to Emmaus has made a significant difference in our community. During National Volunteer Month in April, we honored our 2021 and 2022 Volunteer of the Year Awards with a brick to be installed at the Emmaus Remembrance Garden.

Our Emmaus 2021 Volunteer of the Year, Dr. Anne Zayaitz, was recognized for her outstanding and dedicated work as a founding member and long-standing President of East Penn Neighbors Helping Neighbors. Dr. Zayaitz was part of the early conversations in 2013, when the participants in the Emmaus Ecumenical Ministerium agreed to rent an apartment in Emmaus to support one housing insecure family in our school district. This pilot program led to the successful transitioning of multiple families from housing insecurity to sustainability. As the number of families in need grew, there was a desire to invite others to partner in the good work of helping our homeless. A decision was made in 2014 to transition to the East Penn Neighbors Helping Neighbors Board of Directors and create a new non-religious charitable non-profit 501 (c)3, which was officially approved in 2015. The organization has served at least 10 homeless families since 2014 and we thank Anne for her leadership and support of so many vulnerable families in our community.

Our Emmaus 2022 Volunteer of the Year recently retired as chair of the Emmaus Shade Tree Commission for many years. For his tireless commitment to Emmaus and our healthy tree environment we have been fortunate to have Reds Bailey, a certified arborist as a vocal advocate for trees in our community.



Over the years Reds saw value in all trees and would seek ways to protect and preserve trees in Emmaus. He coordinated efforts with the Borough and made tree recommendations, personally made the selections; he advised property owners on selecting a new tree or, more often, troubleshooting a tree that was storm-damaged or suffering from disease. For years Reds has been the “go-to guy” when it came to diagnosing problems or assessing the structural integrity of older trees. Reds also conducted tree-planting demonstrations for Earth Day and held events at the Emmaus Farmers Market to educate residents on maintaining healthy trees. Between 2012 and 2020 he chose outstanding trees in residential landscapes to receive “tree awards,” marked with a temporary sign.

Emmaus Emergency Services

Over the past 2.5 years Emmaus Ambulance has responded to 671 fall emergencies. That is approximately 10% of our emergency call volume. According to the American Trauma Society, every 11 seconds, an older adult is treated in the Emergency Department for a fall.

Here are a few tips to assist in fall proofing your home:

- Remove throw rugs or use a rug that has a non-slip backing.
- Keep objects off the floor.
- Make sure any cords or wires are up against the wall.



- Increase the lighting in your home, including night lights.
- Place non-slip rubber mats or strips on the floor of your tub or shower
- Install grab bars in frequently used areas of your home.
- Keep your stairway clear and make sure the carpet is firmly attached on each step and handrails are placed on either side of the stairs that extend the length of the stairway.

Curb and Sidewalk Update

The Borough is required to replace its curb ramps with ramps that contain updated federal requirements. Replacement of a single curb ramp is \$5,000; therefore, an entire intersection generally costs approximately \$20,000. The Borough continues to apply for CDBG grant money through Lehigh County to work on these projects. In 2023, the Borough received \$35,000 in CDBG money to do improvements. We have been informed by the county that we should anticipate receiving \$157,550 for 2024. These funds will be used to replace handicap ramps along Main, Chestnut, and some adjacent streets. As Penn Dot informed us that they plan to repave Chestnut and Main Street in 2025, we will be required to replace the ramps on our section of the cross streets during this time. This grant in 2024 will be a great help towards accomplishing this goal.

Emmaus Fire Department



As the crisp autumn air sets in, it's essential to keep fire safety in your mind! Be fire safe this fall with the following tips:

- Check your smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors to ensure they are functioning.
- Maintain your heating systems, this includes fireplaces and heaters. Let the professionals check them for you annually.
- Stay vigilant in the kitchen. Don't leave items unattended on the stove.
- Be mindful of space heaters, maintain at least 3-foot clearance from flammable items.
- Practice safe electric habits, check and inspect all cords for damage, avoid overloading outlets and use surge protectors where appropriate.
- Create and refresh a fire escape plan for you and your family. Designate a meeting place outside the home.



Remember, fire safety is a responsibility that we all share. Let's make this fall season a safe and enjoyable one for everyone! Stay alert, stay Safe!

If you have any specific questions or concerns, feel free to reach out to our fire safety experts.



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Police News:

Trick or Treat Safety Tips from the Emmaus Police Department

TRICK OR TREAT NIGHT

Friday, October 27, 2023 • 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. (Rain or Shine)

It's the time of year for costumes, sweets, tricks and treats. While Halloween offers plenty of make-believe fun, it also brings real safety risks as children dart across dark streets with their minds more on candy than on cars. **Children are twice as likely to be hit by a car on trick or treat night than on any other night of the year.** Burns and cuts are also common during Halloween. And then there's the candy: almost two-thirds of parents think their kids eat too much of it around Halloween.

Trick or Treat can be safely enjoyed, especially when parents put extra care into planning and supervision. Talk with your children every year about safety concerns unique to this holiday and review do's and don'ts before heading out to trick or treat.

Please follow these tips to keep your family safe this spooky season.

Get clever with costumes!

From furry animals to princesses and superheroes, choosing costumes wisely is an important part of trick or treat safety. Follow these tips:

- **The brighter the better.** Whether you buy a costume or make one yourself, choose bright colors and flame-retardant materials. If your child will be trick or treating outdoors after dark, attach reflective tape to his or her costume or treat bag.
- **Size it right.** In case it's chilly outdoors, make sure your child's costume is loose enough for warm clothing to be worn underneath — but not long enough to cause tripping. Avoid oversized shoes and high heels.
- **Skip the masks.** A mask can obstruct your child's vision, especially if it slips out of place. Use kid-friendly, nontoxic makeup instead.
- **Limit accessories.** Pointed props — such as wands, swords and knives — might pose safety hazards. Carry flashlights or wear glowing wristbands instead.

Trick or treat with care!

Before your children start trick or treating, review these basic Halloween safety rules:

- Get in on the fun. Accompany trick or treaters younger than age 12. Pin a piece of paper with your child's name, address and phone number inside your child's pocket in case you get separated. Encourage older kids to trick or treat with a group of friends, parents or older siblings. Make sure someone in the group has a flashlight with fresh batteries.
- Set ground rules. If your child will be trick or treating without you, plan and discuss a familiar route and set a curfew. Review safety rules, including staying with the group, walking only on the sidewalk, approaching only clearly lit homes, and never going inside a home or car for a treat. Have your child carry a cellphone for the evening so that he or she can contact you.
- Inspect treats before indulging. Don't let your child snack while he or she is trick or treating. Feed your child an early meal

before heading out, and inspect the treats before allowing your child to dive in. Discard anything that is not sealed, has torn packaging or looks questionable. If you have young children, weed out gum, peanuts, hard candies and other choking hazards.



If your child has food allergies, check candy labels carefully. Even hard candies may be manufactured in facilities that process nuts, milk, soy, wheat, egg or other allergens.

- Ration the loot. If your child collects gobs of goodies, dole out a few pieces at a time and save the rest. You might even ask your child if he or she would like to swap some — or all — of the candy for something else, such as a special toy, book or outing.
- Plan a party. Consider planning a trick or treat party with a couple of neighbors instead of house-to-house door knocking. Decorate the garages, have a costume contest, or plan games and prizes. Check local schools, malls and churches to find other safe celebration options.

Stay safe and sweet on the home front!

Planning to hand out treats? To make sure you're ready for trick or treaters, follow these tips:

- Clean up. Put away anything trick or treaters could trip over, such as garden hoses, toys, bikes and lawn decorations. Clear wet leaves, snow or other debris from the sidewalk.
- Turn the lights on. Replace any burned-out bulbs to ensure good visibility at the walkway and front door.
- Control your pets. Take no chances that your pet might be frightened and chase or bite a child at your door.
- Consider sugar substitutes. Instead of handing out sugar-laden treats, try stickers, fun pencils, rubber insects or colored chalk.

If you'll be driving on trick or treat, watch for children who might pop out between parked cars. Be especially careful entering or leaving driveways and alleys. Extra caution can help ensure trick or treat safety for everyone.

Carve safely!

Before you start carving pumpkins, consider these Halloween safety rules:

- Decorate with markers, glitter glue or paint. Let young children draw faces on pumpkins with art supplies. Leave any carving to an adult.
- Use candles with care. Place candlelit pumpkins on a sturdy surface away from curtains and other flammable objects. Never leave candlelit pumpkins unattended. Better yet, light pumpkins with flashlights, battery-operated flameless candles or glow sticks instead.

Call Before You Dig

If you are planning on digging, call Pennsylvania One Call System, Inc. (POCS) three business days before you dig at 1-800-242-1776 or 8-1-1. The call center is open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, every day of the year. PA Act 287 as amended requires excavators as well as private landowners to call POCS three days prior to any type of digging occurring with powered equipment. Mark your excavation area in white paint before calling with a dig notification.

By calling, you allow the facility owners the opportunity to locate and mark their underground facility in advance of the planned excavation (gas and liquid pipelines will mark underground facilities using yellow stakes, flags, or paint).

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




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Colonial Educational Project at the Shelter House

To enhance the latest colonial exhibition display at The Shelter House, we are introducing our most recent project, the "jamb stove."

A jamb stove is described as a rectangular box made up of five iron plates to form a cube with an open back. A jamb stove was a source of heat in the early colonial log structures which had little or no insulation. The jamb stove was used from the early 1700's to around 1780's. There is evidence in the fireplace at Shelter House that a jamb stove had been used at one time.

According to Ken Biles, master of this project, "On average it would measure 22"x20"x20". It was located on the opposite side of the kitchen fireplace wall with a hole in the back wall of the fireplace to allow hot coals from the fireplace to be shoveled into the rear opening of the jamb stove. It vented through the fireplace chimney."



What is so fascinating about the colonial jamb stove is that iron masters would create their own designs for the jamb stoves that they crafted. Designs might be the early Germanic motif, such as the well-known thistle finch, tulip or stylized floral motifs, or individual designs created by the iron master. Sometimes the homeowner who commissioned the jamb stove would insist on his own design or signature. Ken Biles will design the motif for the Shelter House jamb stove.

Examples of this beautiful iron work may be seen at the Mercer Museum in Doylestown, PA, The Philadelphia Museum of Art, The Barnes Collection, and many other museums all over the country.

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Go Paperless!

Not sure if you received this quarter's water/sewer or refuse bill? Are you worried about mailing your bills and them getting to their destination by the due date? As a way to offer you more choices in how you pay your bills, the Borough of Emmaus offers paperless billing, online bill payment, and credit card payments to pay your utility bills.

All you need is an Internet connection through a web browser and an email address. Once you sign up for your account and start using the service, you will wonder why you ever waited so long to sign up!

It's simple to use. Every quarter we will send you a reminder email to let you know when your bill is available online. Then, just log in to your account at XpressBillPay.com and view your bill. It's formatted like your paper statement so it will look familiar to you. When you are ready to pay your bill, select a payment type. You can pay with a credit card, debit card, or electric funds transfer. Then enter the information and you're done. It's that easy, and it only takes a few minutes each quarter.

It's free to sign up, but there is a \$3.50 convenience fee to use the single payment, as we are charged transaction fees by the credit card companies, however, automatic reoccurring payments are free.

We offered this service at your request. You asked and we delivered! To sign up, just go to www.emmauspa.gov. On the home page, click pay your bills.

Q&A About Online Bill Payment

Q: Does it cost anything to sign up for online bill payment or paperless billing?

A: No. It's free to sign up for paperless billing and online bill payment and to use the service.

There is a \$3.50 convenience fee for one-time payments to help cover the costs from the credit card companies.

Xpress Bill Pay

Q: What is Xpress Bill Pay?

A: Xpress Bill Pay is the company that the Borough has partnered with to handle paperless and online bill payment.

Q: What payment choices do I have using Xpress Bill Pay?

A: You can pay your utility bills with a credit or debit card, or you can transfer funds directly from your checking account.

Q: What will my paperless bill look like online?

A: It is formatted like your paper statement, so it will look familiar to you.

Q: What other information is available?

A: You can view up to a year's history of your account online, so you can compare your current bill to a year ago.

Q: Do I need to pay my bills from my computer?

A: Not at all. You can continue to pay or bill via mail or in person.

Q: How do I know my payment went through?

A: Once the transaction is complete, you will receive an email receipt to confirm that your payment went through.

Q: Is my information safe?

A: All of the transactions are held on secure servers. As long as you don't give out your password, only you will be able to access your account. Plus, your personal information or email address will not be sold or rented to third parties for marketing purposes without your permission.



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Knauss Homestead Preservation Society

For some of us the coming of the Fall season, only a week or two away, conjures up memories of the Great Allentown Fair, the return to school, the smell of burning leaves, or even a trip or two to the local cider mill for fresh pressed cider.


For those of us at the Knauss Homestead, we ponder life as it was more than 200 years ago. The fall season was an exceptionally busy time of the year for everyone who lived at the homestead. Homestead residents, like all others throughout the countryside, were not only blacksmiths, weavers, wheelwrights, and tinsmiths, but they were farmers as well. Crops not only had to be harvested, but immediately afterward, the fields needed to be tilled and replanted to prepare for next year's crops. Wheat and corn were not harvested by modern machinery, they were harvested by hand. Beans and peas had to be dried and stored in sacks for use in winter soups. Fruits would be sliced and dried for the baking of pies. Herbs and flowers were harvested and dried for medicinal purposes, seasonings, and the dying of wool.

Wool would have to be spun into yarn, which would keep women and children busy knitting and crocheting garments to keep them warm. There was the splitting and stacking of wood for cooking and warmth, and the harvesting of apples for cider making (a staple along with beer since water was considered unsafe). Every man, woman, and child consumed these beverages from breakfast through all the meals of the day. During the fall, hunting would yield meat and fowl to be preserved for winter meals, and fat from the butchered animals would then be boiled, cleansed, and rendered for use in making candles and soap. The process of candle making itself was a multi-day process since the average family would use 700 to 1500 candles a year. The wick of each hand-dipped candle had to be dipped 25 to 30 times to yield a candle of acceptable size.

These are but a few of the many tasks that the fall season brought about, and it required the entire family from the very young to the very old to participate for survival. There certainly was no time for complaining, no sick time, and no idle time for fun. Everyone in the family had a job and every job was necessary for the family to survive.

Through all the hard work there were few, if any, complaints for it was just "Another day on the Farm" There were little snippets of time here and there when thoughts of the upcoming Holiday season found adults thinking about the celebrations to come. The Knauss Homestead has several exciting events coming up, including the September Harvest Festival (being held in conjunction with the Heritage Festival), and of course the traditional Old Fashioned Christmas gatherings.

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PFAS Water Quality Update

While we wish our PFAS issue was completely resolved, as we previously wrote, the Borough was required to conduct a full feasibility study to present to PA DEP regarding all of the different possible mitigation options to free our drinking water from PFAS. This study was completed by Gannett Fleming, an engineering firm that specializes in environmental sciences and has extensive experience dealing with PFAS in drinking water systems. The study examined the possibilities of outsourcing our drinking water to the City of Allentown's system, treating our current wells, digging new wells, as well as a hybrid of different options.

Upon the completion of the study, the engineers conducted two public meetings, whereby over 200 of our residents attended both in-person and virtually. Gannett Fleming presented their findings, as well as the cost estimates with each finding. It was evident in the public meetings that the members of our community were overwhelmingly in favor of the Borough finding an adequate treatment solution for the wells, rather than outsourcing our water supply. Our residents maintained that it was important to the community that we have control of our drinking water supply and quality. Borough Council voted in favor of this option after hearing all feedback from members in attendance.

So, what are the next steps?

Gannett Fleming explained in the meetings that this could take up to two years unfortunately, as extensive engineering needs to be conducted for every one of the Borough's wells. In addition, there is a long lead-time on permitting from PA DEP. Moreover, with the shipping and construction of the system, it will take time, as we will need to re-plumb most wells, construct buildings, and ensure that the water's chemical make-up is not affected by the additional treatment systems.

The estimated cost to construct this system is \$16 million! Why? While the Borough is only required to treat wells # 1 and # 2, which are located near the fire training grounds, we have found low levels of PFAS in nearly all of the wells in the Borough. These low levels, while still considered acceptable levels according to PA DEP, EPA is proposing to lower those levels. Rather than waiting to see what happens, the Borough's intention is to completely eliminate all levels of PFAS from

every well in our system.

Why is there PFAS in the rest of the system?

It is NOT from firefighting foam. Rather, numerous studies across Pennsylvania and across the nation are discovering PFAS in all forms of water. A worldwide study recently discovered PFAS in rain water / snow as far south as Antarctica. A Bucks County study showed PFAS levels in deer, and a nationwide study showed elevated PFAS levels in freshwater fish and salmon in our rivers, streams, and the Great Lakes. Most recently, a U.S. Geological Survey study recently discovered that is estimated that PFAS is detected in over 50% of all drinking water in Pennsylvania! We believe that number may be higher, as nearly ½ of PA drinking water systems haven't even been tested for PFAS yet. In Emmaus, several of our wells are near the creeks, as the well at Community Park is located along the creek, as is the well at the very north part of the community. Both wells draw water from the creek and underlying ground water. They are the sole sources of the water supply in those areas, and there are no industries, firefighting facilities, or other significant contributor in the immediate vicinity that could be a source of the slightly elevated PFAS levels. Instead, the likely source is that the creek water and groundwater contain PFAS compounds that are affecting the levels.

What are the Dangers and What are We Doing?

As we have previously written, there is a potential danger from PFAS to people. The consequences of PFAS exposure are long-lasting — the compounds can stay in the environment, and the human bloodstream, for years. The chemicals have been linked to some cancers, thyroid disease, ulcerative colitis, developmental delays in children, and other health conditions. The problem is that nobody truly knows how long we have all been exposed to PFAS over the years, as it is a chemical compound that has only recently been tested. This is why we want to treat ALL of our wells, rather than just the ones that we are currently mandated to treat. So, what should you do in the next two years while waiting? Technically, you don't have to do anything, per PA DEP. However, we would recommend that you might consider a water

filtration system at your house. If that is an option you are exploring, please note that there are only a few types of filters that can remove PFAS levels. They should either be carbon-based filters or reverse-osmosis filter systems. If the proposed system is different than either option, we recommend getting written confirmation that it removes PFAS chemicals out of water, as most systems are not capable of doing this. In addition, we have been asked by numerous individuals if the Borough would pay for you to purchase a system. The simple answer is no. It is important to understand that you would ultimately be paying for the system anyway, as all Borough expenses are obtained through fees passed along to our residents.

What is this Infrastructure Fee I see in my bill?

The Borough instituted the infrastructure fee for several reasons this year, all dealing with treatment and improvements to the water system. First, the feasibility study cost approximately \$30,000 to complete. Secondly, the engineering for the treatment system is estimated to cost upwards of \$100,000. Moreover, the Borough is in need of serious maintenance on our holding tanks. This is estimated to cost over \$1 million, but it will increase the life of our tanks by more than 50 years. A single holding tank costs over \$4 million to purchase, so it is imperative to make repairs and improvements while the tanks are in good enough shape to do this work. Lastly, with the impending \$16 million PFAS treatment costs, this fee is going to be vital to be able to pay for financing that we will most likely need. With all of this said, we have applied for and are in the process of applying for numerous grants to hopefully offset the bulk of these very large costs. We cannot depend on grants to pay for this though, as we have to prepare to pay for it without financial assistance.

What is going on with the Lawsuit?

The Borough filed a lawsuit against over 1 dozen fire foam manufacturers. Several of the manufacturers have tried to settle the class action lawsuits recently. Our attorneys have advised us to opt out of the settlements, as the Borough would not benefit nearly as much as the harm in which we've incurred. Additionally, the terms of the proposed settlements are not favorable to any public water

supplier, therefore, most water suppliers across the nation will most likely refuse to settle. We will continue to pursue the companies that were guilty of knowingly providing foam with PFAS chemicals in, yet refused to inform us of the same.

PFAS

What are the Current Levels?

We are required to test the two wells every quarter. Rather than just testing those wells, we are testing all of our wells. We provide press releases with the results of the two wells; however, we are continuing to monitor the others.

Testing results that were received on May 12, 2023, show that our system exceeds EPA Lifetime Health Advisory Level for PFOS / PFOA. The Lifetime Advisory Level for PFOS 14 parts per trillion (14 ng/L) and 18 parts per trillion (18 ng/L) for PFOA. PFOS / PFOA levels exceeding this level were found at both Well #1 and Well #2 within the Borough. Both wells share the same aquifer. Well #1 tested at an elevated level of 224.1 ng/L per tests conducted by the Borough. Well #2 tested at 1084.8 ng/L per tests conducted per tests conducted by the Borough. While both levels are less than previous reports, they remain above acceptable standards. Well #2 has been disconnected and deactivated since initial test results were received in October 2021. Well #1 remains operations, however, a mandatory detailed feasibility study was recently completed to select a proper treatment option of the water system.

Although we are not required to report the other readings, it is our goal to be transparent with our community. Therefore, it is vital for us to share our latest readings with you. At well #4 located at Boroline Park, PFOS read at 3.44 ng/L and 5.82 ng/L for PFOA. For well #7 located at the end of Macungie Ave, PFOS read at 4.59 ng/L and PFOA read at 14.6 ng/L. Lastly, at well #6 located at Community Park, PFOS read at 9.30 ng/L and PFOA at 5.21 ng/L.

We are continuing to work as quickly as possible to mitigate this chemical intrusion. While we are relieved that we have a path to move forward, the work is just beginning. We will continue to keep our community members informed and updated as this process progresses.

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Building Construction Update



By the time this newsletter reaches your front door, it is our hope that Borough Hall will have already moved back into our building located at 28 S. 4th Street. Borough Hall and the Central Fire and Ambulance Station have undergone significant construction improvements to update our facilities over the past two years. We are projected to move into both buildings by September 1st. Improvements to the Police Department building, although much smaller in scope, are scheduled to be completed by mid-September.

Although this project has been a very large undertaking, it was a much-needed project. In Borough Hall, the building contained old fuse boxes with mixed knob and tube wiring as well as modern wiring. The plumbing did not properly function, and the sole source of heating for the building became space heaters in individual's offices, as well as wall air conditioning units. Safety was a major concern in the building, and there was a big need for upgraded utilities. In addition, there was a great amount of water infiltration in the basement area and asbestos throughout the building. Therefore,

any cut into the floors, or replacement of plumbing, needed complete asbestos mitigation. Additionally, there were leaks into the building due to the need to repoint the block and the need to make significant repairs to the roof drainage system, which was originally designed to flow down through a pipe that was actually inside the walls of the building. Moreover, additional meeting space was needed for public meetings. The codes department has its own section of the building, rather than being crammed into the same room with the copy machine and the Public Works Director. We also improved ADA access, as members of the community can now use the elevator from street level to access the building.

In central station, the building was originally constructed for volunteer ambulance and fire departments. It did not have proper amenities to meet modern day requirements, and especially to meet the requirements for two full-time departments. Medicine and medical supplies were locked in an old wooden cabinet, rather than being stored in a properly secured room. Report writing was in the same location as the day room for ambulance employees. The training

room also served as the kitchen, as well as the voting location during elections, which required people to walk past our offices, interrupting the flow of business each day. There was not a secured area just for people to vote. The project included a 3,600 sq. ft. addition to the building, a new training facility where the public can separately enter, and secured offices and spaces that will allow the departments to properly meet federal requirements for report-writing, keeping medicine secure, and meeting all other state and federal requirements. In the police station, there was a need to expand the evidence room, as there is a great deal of evidence that must be kept for up to 99 years. Because of this, the building did not have adequate storage. We made a few other small improvements to help the work area be more efficient for the department as well and added a new garage onto the back of Borough Hall for storage of some of the vehicles that have been stored outside.

We look forward to opening our renovated facilities for you to be able to conduct your public business this fall!

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Parking Kiosk

One of the needs that have been identified by our businesses and patrons in the downtown for many years has been the need for more downtown parking. When Wells Fargo sold their building and parking lot on Main Street, the Borough saw an opportunity to rent the parking lot from the new owners. This would provide community members with additional parking opportunities in the downtown. Because of the cost to the taxpayers to rent (and possibly purchase the lot in the future), and for the cost of enforcement of the area, Borough Council decided to install a parking kiosk for the parking lot. The lot contains approximately 45 parking spaces and is \$1 per hour to park. Additionally, member of the community can obtain limited parking permits during the day and for evening hours at \$35 per month to park in the lot. The lot provides residents and visitors with an off-street parking option in the downtown. The kiosk has an App that can be downloaded, can be paid by credit cards, and by plugging the machine with quarters.



Road Projects and S. 2nd St. Updates

The S. 2nd Street reconstruction project from Main Street to the Borough line has been awarded to Barker and Barker Paving for \$586,143.65. A large portion of the project cost is covered by a grant obtained by the Borough. We are extremely happy that the lowest bid came in much less than the anticipated cost. The project has been delayed because UGI will be upgrading their gas lines in the area. Therefore, our portion of the project will not begin until after the new service and main lines are installed. We anticipate having the project completed by the end of October.

Asphalt Maintenance Solutions won the bituminous bid in the amount of \$23,650 to do sealcoating improvements in different sections of the community. This work is slated to begin in August. Additionally, the Borough is preparing to award a contract for street reclamation on Fernwood Street between Mountain Boulevard and Alpine Street, and part of Banner Street. This work includes full depth reclamation and a super pave of the area. The Borough

anticipates doing more projects like this in the future, as they are more budget friendly and often just as effective as milling and paving project. This project is slated to begin in September.

The Franklin Street sewer reconstruction project has recently been awarded to Ankiewicz Enterprises, Inc. for \$182,715. The project will be the final leg of improvements on Franklin Street that previously included installation of new water lines. We anticipate permanently repaving this area next year.

The Borough continues to plan for street improvements throughout the community, as we continue to build out our long-term street improvement plan. In addition, as UGI continues to install new lines in the street, we continue to work with them to repave sections of our streets for the entire width of the lane that was affected by trenching. We will continue to update you as we plan new projects.

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Household Hazardous Waste / Dumpster Day

It's back! In keeping with our promise of providing Dumpster Day and a Household Hazardous Waste collection day every two years, the events are back this year! The Borough has scheduled **Dumpster Day for Saturday, September 16th. The event, once again, will be held at the Fire Training Grounds on Klines Lane. The Household Hazardous Waste collection day will be held on Saturday, October 21st at Emmaus Community Park.**

WHAT: Dumpster Day

WHEN: Saturday, September 16th from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

WHERE: Fire Training Grounds – Klines Lane

This event is designed for you to clean out some of the junk in your basement and house that you have been meaning to clean up. We will **NOT** accept building materials such as shingles, bricks, concrete, or other construction material. We will accept furniture, white goods, and other items laying around your house. We will **NOT** accept food waste at this event. We will **NOT** accept items such as paint or other chemicals. Save those items for our Household Hazardous Waste event. The event will allow for any household waste that is not food waste or regular trash. The event will allow for you to dispose of old tires, batteries and other household hazardous waste, and other items like your old couch, air conditioner, or other bulk items.

The event is designed for our residents (**Borough Residents Only** – ID's will be checked at the gate – **NO BUSINESSES**) to bring items to the Borough that are difficult to dispose of. It's an opportunity for you to do some fall housecleaning and get rid of some of those items that you just don't know what to do with.

We will also accept Electronic Recycling items at the event as well. **This drop off event will be in lieu of the regularly scheduled E-Waste Drop Off in September.**

We will also accept tires and items containing freon.

Charges for items will be as follows:

- **Household Items: No charge**
- **Electronics: No charge**
- **White goods (washer / dryer): No charge**
- **Tires: \$5 each**
- **Batteries (such as car batteries): \$5 each**
- **Items containing freon (such as dehumidifiers, air conditioners, refrigerators, freezers, etc): \$30 each.**

WHAT: Household Hazardous Waste Day

WHEN: Saturday, October 21st from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

WHERE: Emmaus Community Park

This is the event where you will be able to get rid of some of your household chemicals, oil, and paint. (We will not accept latex-based paint, as you can dry that out at home and throw it in the garbage. However, oil-based paint and other types of paint will be accepted). There are certain items that we will not accept, including mercury and several other items that will be outlined on our Facebook Page and / or Borough website.

Generally Accepted Items:

- Automotive Products, such as antifreeze, brake fluid, motor oil and filters, fuels, etc.
- Garden Chemicals, such as fertilizers, insect sprays, herbicides, pesticides, and weed killer.

- Paint Products, such as chalk, glue, paint, stain, stripper, thinner, wood preservative.
- Household Chemicals, such as ammonia, heavy-duty cleaners, naval jelly, tile remover, and strippers.
- Universal Materials, such as batteries, compact fluorescent lamps (CFL), non-mercury thermometers, fluorescent tubes.

What is NOT Accepted:

- Ammunition, explosives, asbestos, or any material that is not in a labeled container or is leaking.
- Latex Paint – please do NOT put this in with your other chemicals, as it is not considered a hazardous waste item, and will only add cost to the event. We will take latex paint, only because we are looking for an outlet to donate it to, however, please separate this from the other paint or chemicals you may have.
- Mercury or other highly volatile substances that are extremely uncommon (at the discretion of the collection team)

The Police Department will also be on location with the medicine drop-off box for anyone that wants to drop off any of their old medicine as well. More details will follow for this event as well.

We will also distribute some educational material at the event regarding refuse, recycling, and hazardous waste reduction.

This event is open to BOROUGH RESIDENTS ONLY! This event is NOT designed for businesses.

How Do These Events Work?

A team of Borough employees, volunteers, Whitetail Disposal, and several contracted hazardous waste haulers will be at the Emmaus Community Park ready to help you dispose of your items. There will be multiple dumpsters on site. Each person will be directed to show their identification. If there is not a Borough resident in the vehicle, the vehicle will be turned away. Payment for different items, such as tires or freon items will be paid at this point, as a log and inventory of the general type of vehicles will be taken. Vehicles will be directed to dumpsters that are lined up, based on what is in the vehicle. We will have a dumpster for electronic waste, metal, multiple dumpsters for general waste, a dumpster for tires, and dumpsters for the hazardous waste. You might be required to assist in unloading your vehicle, however, our employees and volunteers will do their best to assist you as well. After you have unloaded your vehicle, you will be directed out the road. You are permitted to come back to the site as many times as you need to.



We encourage you to take advantage of the event and use it for some fall cleaning and to part ways with some of that paint or different chemicals that you haven't found a home for, as well as parting ways with that old couch or other stuff that's been sitting in storage for a long time. Please don't wait until the last minute to show up. We expect there to be lines and it will take time to get everyone through. We look forward to seeing you!

THE EMMAUS VETERANS COMMITTEE

The Emmaus Veterans Committee consists of honorably discharged veterans who have served in any branch of the U.S. military. 

Permits are Required

Do you need a building or zoning permit? Applications are available online! Download applications for permits right off of our website at: www.emmauspa.gov

On the website home page, under the Services drop down menu, click on "Forms/Applications" and choose which application you need. Simply fill it out and return the completed application to Borough Hall at 28 S. 4th Street, Emmaus so we can begin processing your permit. Some examples of permits that the Borough of Emmaus require include roof repairs, building repairs or remodels (causing structural changes), footers, foundation, framing, plumbing, electrical, signs, fences, sheds, dumpsters, demolition, driveways, pools, and zoning.

A moving permit is required for any individual or family moving in, out, or within the Borough. Health & Safety Corner for FALL – A Message from the Board of Health

PREVENTING INFLUENZA

Flu viruses are constantly changing. The composition of U.S. flu vaccines is reviewed annually by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration Vaccines and Related Biological Products Advisory Committee and updated as needed to best match the flu viruses research indicates will be most common during the upcoming season. The 2023-2024 season U.S. flu vaccines will contain an updated influenza A(H1N1)pdm09 component:

- A/Victoria/4897/2022 (H1N1)pdm09-like virus for egg-based vaccines and
- A/Wisconsin/67/2022 (H1N1)pdm09-like virus for cell-based or recombinant vaccines.



estimates show that last season, people who were vaccinated against flu were about 40% to 70% less likely to be hospitalized because of flu illness or related complications.

The recommended timing of flu vaccination has not changed. September and October are the best times for most people to get vaccinated. Flu vaccination in July and August is not recommended for most people, but there are several considerations regarding vaccination in July and August for specific groups of people:

- For adults (especially those 65 years old and older) and pregnant people in the first and second trimester, vaccination in July and August should be avoided unless it won't be possible to vaccinate in September or October.
- Pregnant people who are in their third trimester can get a flu vaccine in July or August in order to ensure their babies are protected from flu after birth, when they are too young to get vaccinated.
- Children who need two doses of flu vaccine should get their first dose of vaccine as soon as vaccine becomes available. The second dose should be given at least four weeks after the first.
- Vaccination in July or August can be considered for children who have health care visits during these months, if there might not be another opportunity to vaccinate them. For example, some children might have medical visits in the late summer before school starts and might not return to see a health care provider in September or October.

The main change in the flu vaccine recommendations is related to giving flu vaccine to people with egg allergies. Most flu vaccines today continue to be produced using an egg-based manufacturing process and therefore contain a small amount of egg proteins, such as ovalbumin. While ACIP has previously recommended that all people 6 months and older with egg allergy should be vaccinated for flu, in the past there have been additional safety measures recommended for administration of egg-based flu vaccine to people who have had severe allergic reactions to egg. The ACIP voted that people with egg-allergy may receive any flu vaccine (egg-based or non-egg based) that is otherwise appropriate for their age and health status. Additional safety measures are no longer recommended for flu vaccination beyond those recommended for receipt of any vaccine.

How well flu vaccine works can depend in part on the match between the vaccine viruses and circulating viruses. Preliminary

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Curbside Leaf Collection

Barring any complications with weather, equipment or emergencies, the Borough of Emmaus will begin its 2023 Curbside Leaf Collection Program on Monday, October 23, 2023, continuing through Friday, December 8, 2023. **The Borough is unable to set specific pick-up dates for leaf pick-up for individual streets.** We recommend that you have them raked out at the beginning of each week. Once the Public Works Department has made a pass through your street, they will not return until the following week. The Public Works Department will collect 2x a week for 6 weeks during the fall season. Please be advised that if the Borough encounters winter weather and must plow, any leaves in the road will be plowed. Every attempt will be made to clean the roads prior to winter. For FINAL COLLECTION the week of December 4th through December 8th, please have your leaves out on Monday morning (December 4th) of the final week. Once we have made our final pass on your street, we will not return.

- If there are low hanging branches overhanging the roadway, the Borough's leaf truck may not be able to pick up the leaves. Please make sure that all overhanging branches are trimmed prior to winter.
- Please rake all leaves to the curb into long narrow rows not more than 18" into the road. Leaves placed on the sidewalk will not be collected. The Public Works Department will not empty bags or other containers; this is the responsibility of the resident. Branches, shrubbery, grass, garbage, dog waste, and other building materials will not be picked up.
- Leaves will not be collected on private property. If leaves are not in place when the crews go by, they will be picked up on the following round through the Borough. No "return trips" will be made to pick them up.
- Residents who have areas designated as "No Parking" (yellow painted curbs) are encouraged to pile leaves at these locations for easier pick up.
- Piles with anything other than leaves **will not** be picked up. These objects will cause damage to the leaf pickup units and put them

out of service at a great expense of time and money to the Borough and its residents.

- Do not place tarps over your leaves. The Public Works Department will bypass them, and they will not be collected.
- To help facilitate the picking up of the leaves, please keep all vehicles away from the area where the leaves are piled. The Public Works Department will not rake piles of leaves out from between parked cars or from under them.
- Do not pile leaves on or around storm drains as this will cause flooding issues and create unsafe driving conditions.

Please do not place leaves out prior to the starting date! If you would like to remove your leaves prior to the start of leaf collection, you may drop your leaves off at the Emmaus Borough Compost Site located off of Klines Lane.

Saturdays: 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. (Loading until 3:30 p.m.)

The Compost Site will close for the season on Saturday, December 2nd, but will reopen on Monday, December 11th through Friday, December 15th from 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. for additional leaf and yard waste drop-off.

We only accept organic yard waste. No lumber, root balls with dirt, garbage, dirt, building materials, etc. is allowed.

Unscreened compost, wood chip mulch, and screened compost is available for hand loading or a loading fee of \$25.00 per scoop or partial scoop. Only pick-ups or small trailers will be loaded.



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VISIT THE 1803 HOUSE IN 2023

The 1803 House was constructed by Jacob Ehrenhardt, Jr., son of one of the original founders of Emmaus. It is constructed of local fieldstone and natural materials in the Federal Style with a Georgian influence. Jacob constructed his house using local natural materials (fieldstone, wood, millwork and sawn wood shingles). One of the prominent features of this house is the fieldstone cornerstones. To construct a fieldstone house, you need to accurately layout the four corners and square them up. The cornerstones are carefully dressed fieldstone of various shapes and sizes. On a sunny day you will notice that each stone is a unique color.

The other feature of the stonework is how accurately they are placed. The stones are set using a plumb line (a weighted string) and level. The stones are woven course by course and supported with smaller stones course by course and is a great example of superior colonial workmanship. The house was built like a fortress with many windows, and the interior is filled with light.

Our community is filled with cornerstones of a different type. The community is filled with cornerstones of history, including the Shelter House, Knauss Homestead, 1803 House, Emmaus Historical Society, Emmaus Moravian Church, God's Acre, and others. They all have the same mission - telling the story of Emmaus, Pennsylvania. Take the time to visit these special places and walk on the footsteps of history.
