Mark your calendar for Saturday, October 18th, 2025, at 7:00 p.m. for the much-awaited Emmaus Halloween Parade. In case of rain, the parade will be held on Sunday, October 19th, at 6:30 p.m. All participants must be registered, and registration forms are available on the Borough website, www.emmauspa.gov, or the parade website, www.emmausparade.com. The deadline for registration is October 11th, 2025.

Participation Criteria for businesses and groups:

- Business/Group Floats:** Your business name can be displayed on the vehicle pulling the float. Decorate both the vehicle and float with a Halloween theme.
- Marchers/Participants:** Participants can wear shirts with the business name, but they should also be in Halloween costumes that match the float's theme.
- Float Banners:** The back or side of your float can have a banner with a message like "Happy Halloween from [Your Company]". The business name should not dominate the banner.
- No Branded Giveaways:** You can hand out store-bought candy, but please avoid giving out items like toothbrushes or pens with your company logo.

Please remember, we reserve the right to refuse participation to those who do not meet these criteria. Stick to the guidelines to help make the parade an even bigger and more fun event for everyone!

Rules and Regulations:

To ensure the safety of all participants and spectators, please adhere to the following rules:

- No drilling or exhibitions of any type.
- No bicycles, skateboards, rollerblades, scooters, or motorcycles unless they are part of a float. Three- or four-wheelers are allowed only if pulling a float.
- Licensed vehicles must be fully decorated in a Halloween theme or pulling a float.
- No open fires, fireworks, or alcoholic beverages.
- Do not throw or project anything, including candy, silly string, or coins. Handing out candy is permitted, but it should not be thrown from floats or vehicles. This is for safety reasons. It can be very difficult for float drivers to see the children during the parade.
- No excessive business advertising and **NO** political advertising.

7. A concession permit is required for anyone selling items along the parade route, including outside sales by stores at fixed locations. We will also have food trucks located on the Emmaus Borough parking lot on Main Street.

Volunteer Opportunities:

The Halloween Parade Committee needs more volunteers to help our traditions grow! We could really use some more help on the night of the parade. Consider volunteering for one of the following positions:

- **Division Captains:** Format the division and walk with the parade to keep it secure and orderly. (5:30 p.m. until the parade ends) Eight to ten Division Captains are needed.
- **Float Formation Area:** Line up all the floats according to the parade format. (5:00 p.m. until the parade starts) Four to six volunteers are needed.
- **Parade Walkers:** Walk with a parade division to help ensure everyone's safety. You would be needed by 6:30 PM until the parade ends. We could use 8 to 10 more volunteers.

Halloween Parade Committee Meetings are held every Thursday at 7:00 p.m. starting September 18th, with the final meeting on Thursday, October 16th, at 7:00 p.m. Meetings will be held in the Community Room at Borough Hall, 28 S. 4th Street, Emmaus.

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



Summer has always been a celebratory time in the Borough of Emmaus. Starting in 1909 with the Golden Jubilee, which commemorated 50 years since the Borough was incorporated in the summer of 1859. This was followed by the 1934 Diamond Jubilee, the 1959 Centennial Celebration, the 1984 Homecoming (125 years), and the 2009 Anniversary for the Sesquicentennial (150 years) and 250 years since our founding. Of course, we didn't let America's 1976 Bicentennial go by without a celebration.

Let's not forget the celebrations held by the Fire Departments. 1925 was a Four County Firemen's Convention held in the Borough of Emmaus. In 1949 and 1952 new trucks were paraded as part of the housing of the new equipment. In 1971 the Firemen's Centennial celebrated 100 years since the founding of the Fire Department.



The Society and Borough enjoy many events throughout the year, and these events include the involvement, cooperation and support of the Emmaus Historical sites, area Historical Societies and participation in community events. Working together benefits us all!

Borough Employees Volunteer at Hydromania



On May 8, 2025, four Borough employees volunteered at Hydromania, held on the campus of Cedar Crest College. Now in its 22nd year, Hydromania is put on by the Lehigh Valley Water Suppliers Group and is all about "water." One Borough employee has volunteered since the inception of the event, while for others this was their first year. Hundreds of 3rd and 4th graders from schools across the Lehigh Valley spend their day at Hydromania



learning about water and why it's so important to the world around us. Students participated in a variety of interactive exhibits and learning stations, each of which answered different water-themed questions. They learned about water treatment plants, created bracelets, book bag charms, and met the event's famous mascot, Dewy, the drop. The event aims to generate curiosity, excitement, and understanding about all things water, while developing a new generation of water stewards.

EMMAUS HERITAGE FESTIVAL

On Saturday Sept. 20th the Emmaus Heritage Alliance will hold their annual Heritage Festival on the grounds of the Emmaus Historical Society at 218 Main St, from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. The Alliance is celebrating 33 years as a forum for historic issues within the Borough. It was created in 1992 at the urging of former Borough Council member Rick Zayaitz, as a way for local historic groups to meet and discuss common goals. It has since become a valuable tool for planning events and for promoting the heritage of Emmaus.

History really can be fun! The festival will include inside and outside displays of its member groups, good food, entertainment, and children's activities. It will also include demonstrators such as weaving, pottery making, blacksmithing, PA long rifle lore, as well as animals and hands-on children's activities by the Wildlands Conservancy.

We are partnering on that same day with the Emmaus Main Street Partners' "Farewell to Summer" event held in the downtown. Heritage Alliance members include the Emmaus Historical Society, Shelter House Society, Knauss Homestead Preservation Society, the Friends of the 1803 House, the Emmaus Public Library, Emmaus Moravian Church, and the Emmaus Main Street Partners.

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


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Saying Goodbye

April impacted so many lives through her life's commitment to emergency services, working in the healthcare field, and as a volunteer on the county animal rescue team. She will be missed by all of us. She and her husband Shawn, a Captain in our Fire Department, have dedicated their lives to serving others. We will never forget the impact that April has had on our world. May you rest in peace April.



April Rae (Bond) Lubenetski obituary

51 years of age and resident of Lehigh Township, passed away peacefully surrounded by family and friends on Monday evening May 19, 2025 while receiving excellent care at the Saint Lukes Brian D. Perin Hospice House in Lower Saucon Township. She is a Master Firefighter for the Emmaus Fire Department and a Firefighter/EMT for Lehigh Township Volunteer Fire Company #1.

Born in Allentown, she was a daughter of Ronald and Sue Ellen (Nothstein) Bond, and the loving wife of Shawn Michael Lubenetski since 2000.

April was a member of the Emmaus Fire Department for over 24 years and volunteer with the Lehigh Valley County Animal Rescue Team. She was a Firefighter/EMT, and previous member of Han-Le-Co and Catasauqua Fire Departments. April was a Rescue & HAZMAT Specialist with Lehigh County Special Operations and PA USAR Co #3. April has over 26 years in the Emergency Services.

"April has dedicated more than two decades of her life serving the citizens of Emmaus & surrounding areas of Lehigh and Northampton Counties" "During her tenure, April served with steadfast courage, unwavering determination, and honor. Her character, compassion, and dedication to her fellow firefighters shall never be forgotten."

Lehigh Township Fire Company announced that April served with the Fire Company starting in 2008. Despite her diagnosis, she was still seen at the fire company's events that she could physically go to. "Her commitment and dedication to public safety will never be forgotten," the post reads. "Our hearts go out to all who served by her side."

April was a Lead Customer Service Representative for United HealthCare. She attained her Associates Degree in Criminal Justice from Northampton Community College, with specialized training in Alcohol and Chemical Dependency Counseling.

April loved to travel to Disney World, the Outer Banks 4x4 beach house, the Finger Lakes, Maine, Yellowstone National Park, and just about anywhere with her friends. But her ultimate pleasure was spending time with Godchildren, nieces and nephews. April was a very selfless person and would make sacrifices so others could succeed.

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Ongoing Sewer Rehab Work

We have previously announced that the Borough is part of the shared responsibility to make significant upgrades to the Allentown Sewer Plant at Klines Island. This project is going to cost the region somewhere around \$300 million, with each municipality being required to pay its share. Along with that, it is expected that each municipality will continue to remove rainwater, groundwater, and runoff water from the sewer system. Over the past decade, the Borough has worked hard to accomplish this, however, we have a lot of work to continue to do. The Borough Manager recently obtained a \$425,000 Small Water & Sewer Grant to continue to work on removing inflow and infiltration of water from the sewer system. This project was awarded for construction during the Summer. The contractor will be making repairs to upwards of 100 manholes throughout the Borough. It will include rebuilding the manhole chimneys, replacing lids with water-tight lids, and making the manhole resistant from groundwater entering. A very large portion of the water entering into the sewer system is from rainwater entering through manholes.

Another area of infiltration is through leaky pipes underground. Often, this is a result of tree root infiltration or old pipes. Our sewer system was originally constructed between 1959 and 1962, making it the 2nd oldest system in Lehigh County. This also makes our pipes the 2nd oldest in Lehigh County. These pipes were often made from material that was not designed for the type of impact, road weight, resistance to roots, and earth movement that we experience in today's world. This makes many of our pipes susceptible to taking on underground water. Another initiative of the Borough continues to be to conduct lateral inspections at the time of a property sale, as it is found that these are often one of the leading sources of water infiltration. Moreover, our Public Works Department continues to use our sewer camera system to identify areas in our sewer mains that are cracked or are taking on water from underground springs or rainwater infiltration.

By eliminating this water from our sewage system, it helps the environment and helps prevent the sewer plant from having to dump raw sewage into the Lehigh River during a very heavy rainstorm. For example, our borough averages less than 1 million gallons per day of sewage to the sewer plant. However, when there is a very hard rainstorm, our meters show we are transporting nearly 5 million gallons. It's not because everyone panics and uses the bathroom facilities. It's because the rainwater is making its way to the system. If the Allentown Plant is overwhelmed and cannot hold the water coming in, there is only one alternative, which is to open the gates up and let the water / sewage out. This is not only an environmental hazard, but it is a violation of DEP regulations.

By continuing to focus on eliminating this issue in our community, we are helping with this environmental issue, and we are being compliant with DEP and EPA regulations.



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More Grant Funding

Our Borough staff continues to work hard to find creative ways to pay for infrastructure projects, equipment, and upgrades to the community. We partner with different organizations, and work with Borough Council to explore alternative ways to pay for different projects to continue the progression of our community. In 2024, Borough staff received \$2,069,282 in grant funds from 10 different grants. In 2025, the Borough has received approximately \$10 million in grant funding. It is important to understand that grants are very specific and can only be spent on the specific program allocated by the state. Not every project is eligible to be funded by grants. Moreover, grants are very competitive. For every grant the Borough receives, there is at least one or two that were not funded. However, we have been fairly successful in obtaining funding to help pay for different improvements.

Some of the more recent grants that we have received include:

- Our Borough Manager obtained a \$1,000 grant from the Lehigh Valley Chamber Foundation to add additional trash and recycling receptacles in the downtown.

- The Emmaus Community Foundation received a \$1,000 grant from the Lehigh Valley Chamber Foundation to replace benches downtown.
- The Emmaus Community Foundation received a \$3,867 grant from Wingstop to assist the Borough in making repairs and replacing the wood at the bridge to the swimming pool.
- Our Public Works Director obtained a \$200,000 PA DEP grant to help fund the replacement of our Leaf Collection Truck.
- Our Borough Manager obtained a \$80,000 CDBG grant to help replace the handicap curb ramps in the Borough, as mandated by the federal government.
- Our Director of Emergency Services and Borough Manager obtained a \$100,000 grant from Lehigh County to assist with the repairs of the fire tower.
- Our Director of Emergency Services obtained a \$100,000 grant from the PA Fire Commissioner to assist with repairs of the fire tower.

PFAS Building Construction Has Begun

It has been quite a long process to get to this point, but we are very happy to announce that construction on the PFAS mitigation project has begun at Well #1 and Well # 2.

As we previously wrote, there has been a great deal of red tape to get to the point of construction, having navigated several different types of feasibility studies, hydraulic tests, capacity studies, PA DEP permitting, engineering, and navigating through the process to be able to pay for this massive \$11 million project. Now that it is all done, we have finally been able to put shovels to the ground.

Our Borough Manager, in partnership with Gannett Fleming Engineers, worked to obtain financing through Penn Vest, a primary funding source for large utility projects. Penn Vest originally awarded the Borough with \$11,780,000 in financing, with \$9,731,255 of that funding being awarded as grant funds. Once the project went out to bid, and all engineering, legal, and administrative fees were calculated, the funding was reduced, as the total project cost was reduced to \$9,396,000 due to bids being lower than expected. Penn Vest reduced funding proportionately to \$7,762,036 in grant money and \$1,633,964 in a loan. The loan interest rate is 1.743% for 5 years, and then 1% thereafter.

The project includes the reconstruction of both well pumps, the construction of a large building that will house 4 tanks that are approximately 25 feet high and nearly 12 feet wide, a lab and other

facilities, several underground tanks, and the associated plumbing and other infrastructure that is needed for the system. The system will be a carbon-based treatment system, with the four tanks treating the water as it comes through. Our wells pump up to 650 gallons of water per minute. This, accompanied with the level of PFAS concentration in the wells, is why the tanks need to be as large as they are, and the treatment system needs to be as robust as it is. The carbon will be changed out with new carbon to ensure the ongoing treatment is effective about every 10 months. The annual maintenance to do this will be approximately \$100,000 per year. The system is designed that the PFAS reading coming out of the tanks into the water system will read at "0".



The project timeline is as follows:

May – August: Site work / concrete, + EQ Tank
August – October: Building Construction
October – November: Masonry
November: GAC Tanks Arriving and Installation
November – March: Interior Work
March – May: Restoration Work

Additional Water Tank Rehabilitation

In addition to mitigating the PFAS in the water system, the Borough recently conducted inspections inside all the water holding tanks at our wells. It was discovered that the well tanks needed significant repairs. The study showed that there were significant repairs needed to each of the tanks, with the cost reaching over \$1.6 million. Our Borough Manager obtained a \$1.2 million H2O grant for the rehabilitation project.

The tank rehabilitation project includes sandblasting, patching, and repairing the inside and outside of each of the holding tanks, including repainting each tank. The cost to replace a small holding tank on a well is approximately \$4 million, and without making the necessary repairs, we would most likely need to replace at least 1 or 2 of the tanks within the next 5 to 10 years. This project extends the life expectancy of each tank by approximately 50 years, and ensures that no chipped paint, rust, or debris would be polluting the system, resulting in more treatment. To date, we have completed the work in one of the two large holding tanks on S. 5th Street, and the tank at the end of Macungie Avenue. Next year, the project will be completed with the remaining tanks being repaired.

Boy Scout Projects in the Borough

We are excited to be partnering with several local Boy Scouts in our community. As these boys are growing into young men, to obtain their Eagle Scout status, they are required to do a community project. Currently, three Boy Scouts in the community are either planning or are working on different projects.

Ethan Maurer is currently planning to reinstall a Gaga Pit at Emmaus Community Park. The previous Gaga Pit that was installed was unfortunately washed away in a flood. Ethan is planning to build a new pit a bit farther from the creek.

Isaac Maurer is also planning a project in the park. While plans aren't finalized, he is hoping to install new benches along the walking trail at Community Park.

Cenzo Roosa is currently planning a project as well, as he is possibly planning to rebuild the horseshoe pits at Community Park.



Chase Eiss has already begun his project. He has taken a very aggressive approach to his project, as he is building new dugouts at the South 4th Street Ballfield.

He has been fundraising for this project for several months, as it is projected to cost nearly \$7,000. He has been working with our Public Works Department in planning the project and has just begun working with them to rip out the old benches and dig holes for the new benches that have been ordered. In August, he will be building the dugout structure with a group of friends and peers.

Borough Using See My Legacy Platform

The Borough is using a new platform called "See My Legacy". The program is a community giving platform designed to allow different organizations to seek donations for different civic-driven initiatives, and to engage the community for different initiatives. It is designed to allow organizations to launch campaigns, manage participation such as volunteer sign-ups, and to increase community support for different initiatives. The program can be used to recognize individuals through memorial programs, such as when someone donates a bench in someone's name. A plaque is placed on that bench with a QR Code that links to a digital storyboard regarding the individual or organization being honored. Moreover, it is designed to help set up volunteer events, program funding, event sponsorships, capital projects, or even be used for interactive and educational tours.



Wildlands Conservancy Trail Construction

The Borough is partnering with our friends at the Wildlands Conservancy to build additional trails through our community. Several years ago, the Borough sold land to Lehigh County in hopes that the land would ultimately be transformed into trails. The Wildlands Conservancy has undertaken this effort and has spent most of the past several years planning and laying out the trail. Construction of the trail began earlier this year.

Recently, the Borough entered into an agreement with the Conservancy to authorize them to continue building the trail through the woods near the Shelter House on S. 4th Street. The nature trail meanders through the woods and is several miles long. The Borough is also working to obtain an easement with a neighboring property owner to allow the trail to be built through the back edge of their property and to connect to the nature trail that is being built behind the new apartments on Furnace Street. Ultimately, the trail will connect from the bottom of S. 2nd Street, meander through the woods, and leads up the mountain towards the top of S. 2nd Street. There will be a trail head and improved parking area near the S. 4th Street ball fields.



A Message from the Emmaus Board of Health

Why Do More People Get Sick in the Winter?

"The **NOSE** is one of the first points of contact between the outside world and inside the body," stated Dr Benjamin Bleier, director of Otolaryngology Translational Research at Mass. Eye and Ear, and a co-author of the study published in *The Journal of Allergy and Clinical Immunology*.

According to their findings, a crucial frontline immune response, which occurs within nasal passages, becomes significantly less effective when the **nose** gets cold. At issue are microscopic structures known as EVs (extracellular vesicles) which are reduced when the nose is cold. In the presence of certain threats, including bacteria and some respiratory viruses, billions of EVs are released into the mucus of the nose, there, they surround and kill the invaders.

If your mother told you to wear a hat in the winter so you don't, "catch a cold" she may have been on to something. Although you can get sick whether you wear a hat or not, scientists recently discovered that cold weather does play a role in your immune response – particularly within your nose. According to this new research, a decrease of just 9 degrees Fahrenheit in the tissue temperature of the nasal passages cut the number of EVs available to respond to a threat by more than 40%. The colder temperature also caused changes to the composition of the EVs that reduced their efficacy. The researchers theorize that all of this hampers the body's ability to fight respiratory viruses and leads to the annual winter surge.

Some viruses peak in winter months including cold, RSV and COVID. While you can get sick any time of the year, doctors consider it, "Cold and Flu Season" when infections are highest, from October through March.

For years, it has been thought that cold and flu viruses are widespread during the winter months because chillier temperatures drive everyone indoors. Being near others in a group allows viruses to transfer from one person to another more easily. While this is true, we have a new understanding related to temperature.

Influenza symptoms include sore throat, stuffy and runny nose, sneezing, postnasal drip, all leading to fatigue, cough, bronchitis, and fever. It can also lead to pneumonia and other complications requiring hospitalization.

How do they know what to put in the vaccine for the 2025-2026 U.S. Influenza Season? Annually representatives from the Center for Disease Control, Food and Drug Administration, Department of Defense, and Public Health Experts meet to analyze and discuss the viruses that have been prevalent around the world to determine which strains we will see here during our flu season. This year's recommendations are similar to the previous year's strain selections.

There are three vaccines available, which one should I get?

- **Fluzone High-Dose Quadrivalent**, an inactivated vaccine (meaning that it uses the killed version of the germ that cause a disease) approved **for people over 65-plus**, contains four

times the antigen of standard-dose inactivated flu vaccines. Antigen is the part of the vaccine that helps your body build up protection against flu viruses, the CDC explains.

- **Fluad Quadrivalent**, also an inactivated vaccine approved, **for people 65 and older**, has the same amount of antigen as the standard shots but contains an adjuvant, or an ingredient added to the vaccine that helps create a stronger response to vaccination.
- **Flublock Quadrivalent**, approved **for people 18 and older**, is made using a different vaccine technology (it is a recombinant protein vaccine).

The high-dose and adjuvanted flu vaccines may result in more of the mild, temporary side effects that can occur with standard-dose seasonal flu-shots, the CDC says. Expected side effects can include pain, redness or swelling at the injection site, headache, muscle ache and fatigue. These symptoms typically resolve within one to three days.

The decision as to which one of these vaccines you should get is best made between you and your primary care provider.

HAVE YOU GOTTEN YOUR FLU VACCINE YET? This is a common question this time of year. Some people say, "Get one every year," others say, "I never have," or "previously when I got one, I got sick." Keep in mind that vaccines have been proven to be very effective in reducing infections and lowering the risk of severe illness and complications causing hospitalization as well as reduce the spread of the virus.

If you do get the flu, contact your healthcare provider to consider taking an antiviral medication. Note: you need to start this medication within 48hrs. of developing symptoms.

The CDC recommends that everyone over 6 months of age get flu vaccine annually with a very rare exception.

The best time to get your flu shot is early September to late October.

In addition, FREQUENT HANDWASHING and VITAMIN C are also key to avoiding infection.

It's the time of year for costumes, sweets, tricks and treats. While Halloween offers plenty of make-believe fun, it also brings real safety risks as children dart across dark streets with their minds more on candy than on cars. **Children are twice as likely to be hit by a car on trick or treat night than on any other night of the year.** Burns and cuts are also common during Halloween. And then there's the candy: almost two-thirds of parents think their kids eat too much of it around Halloween.

Trick or Treat can be safely enjoyed, especially when parents put extra care into planning and supervision. Talk with your children every year about safety concerns unique to this holiday and review do's and don'ts before heading out to trick or treat.

Please follow these tips to keep your family safe this spooky season.

Get clever with costumes!

From furry animals to princesses and superheroes, choosing costumes wisely is an important part of trick or treat safety. Follow these tips:

- **The brighter the better.** Whether you buy a costume or make one yourself, choose bright colors and flame-retardant materials. If your child will be trick or treating outdoors after dark, attach reflective tape to his or her costume or treat bag.
- **Size it right.** In case it's chilly outdoors, make sure your child's costume is loose enough for warm clothing to be worn underneath — but not long enough to cause tripping. Avoid oversized shoes and high heels.
- **Skip the masks.** A mask can obstruct your child's vision, especially if it slips out of place. Use kid-friendly, nontoxic makeup instead.
- **Limit accessories.** Pointed props — such as wands, swords and knives — might pose safety hazards. Carry flashlights or wear glowing wristbands instead.

Trick or treat with care!

Before your children start trick or treating, review these basic Halloween safety rules:

- **Get in on the fun.** Accompany trick or treaters younger than age 12. Pin a piece of paper with your child's name, address and phone number inside your child's pocket in case you get separated. Encourage older kids to trick or treat with a group of friends, parents or older siblings. Make sure someone in the group has a flashlight with fresh batteries.
- **Set ground rules.** If your child will be trick or treating without you, plan and discuss a familiar route and set a curfew. Review safety rules, including staying with the group, walking only on the sidewalk, approaching only clearly lit homes, and never going inside a home or car for a treat. Have your child carry a cellphone for the evening so that he or she can contact you.

- **Inspect treats before indulging.** Don't let your child snack while he or she is trick or treating. Feed your child an early meal before heading out, and inspect the treats before allowing your child to dive in. Discard anything that is not sealed, has torn packaging or looks questionable. If you have young children, weed out gum, peanuts, hard candies and other choking hazards.
- **If your child has food allergies,** check candy labels carefully. Even hard candies may be manufactured in facilities that process nuts, milk, soy, wheat, egg or other allergens.
- **Ration the loot.** If your child collects gobs of goodies, dole out a few pieces at a time and save the rest. You might even ask your child if he or she would like to swap some — or all — of the candy for something else, such as a special toy, book or outing.
- **Plan a party.** Consider planning a trick or treat party with a couple of neighbors instead of house-to-house door knocking. Decorate the garages, have a costume contest, or plan games and prizes. Check local schools, malls and churches to find other safe celebration options.

Stay safe and sweet on the home front!

Planning to hand out treats? To make sure you're ready for trick or treaters, follow these tips:

- **Clean up.** Put away anything trick or treaters could trip over, such as garden hoses, toys, bikes and lawn decorations. Clear wet leaves, snow or other debris from the sidewalk.
- **Turn the lights on.** Replace any burned-out bulbs to ensure good visibility at the walkway and front door.
- **Control your pets.** Take no chances that your pet might be frightened and chase or bite a child at your door.
- **Consider sugar substitutes.** Instead of handing out sugar-laden treats, try stickers, fun pencils, rubber insects or colored chalk.

If you're driving while trick or treat is taking place, watch for children who might pop out between parked cars. Be especially careful entering or leaving driveways and alleys. Extra caution can help ensure trick or treat safety for everyone.

Carve safely!

Before you start carving pumpkins, consider these Halloween safety rules:

- **Decorate with markers, glitter glue or paint.** Let young children draw faces on pumpkins with art supplies. Leave any carving to an adult.
- **Use candles with care.** Place candlelit pumpkins on a sturdy surface away from curtains and other flammable objects. Never leave candlelit pumpkins unattended. Better yet, light pumpkins with flashlights, battery-operated flameless candles or glow sticks instead.

Do you need a building or zoning permit? Applications are available online! Download applications for permits right off of our website at: www.emmauspa.gov

On the website home page, under the Residents drop down menu, click on "Forms/ Applications" and choose which application you need. Simply fill it out and return the completed application to Borough Hall at 28 S. 4th Street, Emmaus so we can begin processing your permit. If you have any questions about permits, please call the Zoning Department at 610-967-1322 or email efuhrmann@emmauspa.gov or breed@emmauspa.gov.

Some examples of permits that the Borough of Emmaus require include roof repairs, building repairs or remodels (causing structural changes), footers, foundation, framing, plumbing, electrical, signs, fences, sheds, dumpsters, demolition, driveways, pools, and zoning.

A moving permit is required for any individual or family moving in, out, or within the Borough. The application form can be obtained by visiting the Borough website at: www.emmauspa.gov or in person at the Cashier's office, located at 28 S. 4th Street, Emmaus. 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Emmaus Fire Department - Fall Fire Prevention: Stay Safe This Season

As the crisp air of fall sets in and the leaves begin to change, it's the perfect time to enjoy cozy moments by the fire or indulge in seasonal treats. However, the transition into autumn also brings unique fire risks. Here are some essential reminders to help you and your family stay safe this fall.

1. Inspect Heating Equipment

Before firing up your furnace or space heater, schedule a professional inspection to ensure your equipment is in good working order. Clean chimneys and vents to prevent dangerous buildup that could spark a fire.

2. Practice Safe Candle Use

Candles are a fall favorite, but they're also a leading cause of home fires. Keep candles at least 12 inches away from flammable items and never leave them unattended. Consider using flameless LED candles for a safer alternative.

3. Be Cautious with Fireplaces

Ensure your fireplace is free of debris and that the flue is open and operational. Always use a fireplace screen to catch sparks and keep a fire extinguisher nearby for emergencies.

4. Monitor Outdoor Burning

Autumn leaves are beautiful but can pose a fire hazard when burning. Check local regulations and weather conditions before lighting any outdoor fires. Always keep a water source or fire extinguisher on hand.

5. Test Smoke Alarms

7. Plan an Escape Route

Review and practice your family's fire escape plan. Ensure that everyone knows at least two ways out of each room and has a designated meeting spot outside.

8. Be Kitchen Aware

With holiday cooking around the corner, always stay in the kitchen while food is on the stove. Use timers and keep flammable items like dish towels and oven mitts away from burners.

By taking these precautions, you can enjoy the beauty and comfort of fall while ensuring the safety of your home and loved ones. Stay vigilant and have a fire-safe season!

9. Extinguishers

Have a fire extinguisher! One can be purchased at any home improvement store. Always look for the "UL Listed" or "ULC Listed" label on a fire extinguisher to ensure it is certified for use by a nationally recognized testing laboratory.



There are multipurpose fire extinguishers that might be labeled "B-C" or "A-B-C" that can be used on most types of home fires.

10. 911

If you suspect ANY emergency, call 911 FIRST and give your address to the dispatcher. Do not call the fire station; there may not be someone there to answer your call.

The course was designed to educate the participants in the philosophy, policies, operations, practices, and functions of their Emmaus Police Department while enhancing and developing police/community relations. The course is not intended to train or certify citizens to perform law enforcement services. Participants received instruction by Emmaus Police Officers including presentations and demonstrations on various topics:

- Department Overview
- Background Investigations
- Criminal Investigations
- PA Crimes Code, Vehicle Code and Emmaus Borough Ordinance Overview
- K9 Function/Demonstration
- Traffic Stops
- Patrol Function
- School Resource Officer/Juvenile Detective
- Lehigh County Drug Task Force
- Accidents and Accident Reconstruction
- Lehigh County Municipal Emergency Response Team (MERT)
- Use of Force
- Firearm Safety
- Role Playing/Scenario Training

The Emmaus Police Department will begin accepting applications for class #003 of Emmaus Citizen Police Academy (ECPA). The course will begin in February of 2026. The Emmaus Citizen Police Academy will be a nine-week course designed to educate the Borough of Emmaus citizens in the philosophy, policies, operations, practices, and functions of their Emmaus Police Department while enhancing and developing police/community relations. This course is not intended to train or certify citizens to perform law enforcement services.

Participants will receive instructions by Emmaus Police personnel including presentations and demonstrations on various topics:

- Lehigh County Coroner/Death Investigations
- Criminal Investigations

The Emmaus Citizen Police Academy (ECPA) will be a nine-week course consisting of 2.5 hour blocks of instruction from 6pm-8:30pm on Tuesday evenings. The first ECPA class will be held on Tuesday, 2/3/2026, at the Emmaus Police Department. Class will be every Tuesday until March 31st, 2026.

Participant Requirements:

- Applicants must be at least 21 years of age
- Applicants can not have any felony or misdemeanor convictions
- Applicants can not have any open/pending court cases involving felony or misdemeanor crimes
- Applicants must pass a background check conducted by the Emmaus Police Department
- Applicants must be residents of the Borough of Emmaus
- Applicants must be able to attend at least 7 of the 9 scheduled classes

Applications can be picked up in person at the Emmaus Police Department Monday through Friday between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Applications will be available starting on Wednesday October 1st, 2025. Applications are to be returned to the Emmaus Police Department by Friday December 5th, 2025, at 4:00 p.m. Notification of acceptance will be mailed to participants in the first week of January 2026.

Graduation:

Upon successful completion of the Emmaus Citizen Police Academy, participants will be awarded a participation certificate and patch.

School Bus Safety

Per the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania Website:

Pennsylvania's School Bus Stopping Law:

- Motorists must stop at least 10 feet away from school buses that have their red lights flashing and stop arm activated.
- Motorists must stop when they are behind a bus, meeting the bus or approaching an intersection where a bus is stopped.
- Motorists following or traveling alongside a school bus must also stop until the red lights have stopped flashing, the stop arm is withdrawn, and all children have reached safety.
- If physical barriers such as grassy medians, guide rails or concrete median barriers separate oncoming traffic from the bus, motorists in the opposing lanes may proceed without stopping.
- Do not proceed until all the children have reached a place of safety.

Penalties

There are two distinct programs related to violations of Pennsylvania's School Bus Stopping Law.

- Criminal violations: 75 Pa. C.S. § 3345.0(opens in a new tab) (Meeting or overtaking school bus) identifies fines and penalties when a police officer pulls you over for a violation, including:
 - \$250 fine and a \$35 surcharge to be deposited into the School Bus Safety Grant Program Account.
 - Five points on your driving record.
 - 60-day license suspension.

- Civil violations: 75 Pa. C.S. § 3345.1(opens in a new tab) (Automated enforcement of failure to stop for school bus with flashing red lights) allows school entities to install and operate a side stop signal arm enforcement system for the purpose of enforcing the School Bus Stopping Law. Civil violations include only a \$300 fine and don't reflect any points or insurance ratings.

Pedestrian Crosswalk Safety

You might have seen bright orange flags that were replaced at crosswalks throughout the Borough. These flags are meant to increase the visibility and alert drivers of pedestrians in the crosswalk. When you encounter one of these crosswalks with flags follow the procedure below:

- Grab a flag out of the holder.
- Look both ways to make sure the roadway is clear.
- Cross the road while waving the orange flag.
- Place the flag in the holder on the other side of the street.

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Household Hazardous Waste / Dumpster Days Set



It's back! In keeping with our promise of providing Dumpster Day and a Household Hazardous Waste collection day every two years, the events are back this year! The Borough has scheduled **Dumpster Day for Saturday, October 4th. There will be a slight change of location this year, as it will be held at the Compost Site on Klines Lane.**

THERE WILL BE NO COMPOST DROP OFF ON OCTOBER 4th! The Household Hazardous Waste collection day will be held on Saturday, November 1st at Emmaus Community Park.

WHAT: Dumpster Day

WHEN: Saturday, October 4th from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

WHERE: Compost Site – Klines Lane

REMEMBER – NO COMPOST DROP OFF ON OCTOBER 4TH

This event is designed for you to clean out some of the junk in your basement and house that you have been meaning to clean up. We will **NOT** accept building materials such as shingles, bricks, concrete, or other construction material. We will accept furniture, white goods, and other items laying around your house. We will **NOT** accept food waste at this event. We will **NOT** accept items such as paint or other chemicals. Save those items for our Household Hazardous Waste event. The event will allow for any household waste that is not food waste or regular trash. The event will allow you to dispose of old tires, batteries, and other items like your old couch, air conditioner, or other bulk items.

The event is designed for our residents (**Borough Residents Only** – ID's will be checked at the gate – **NO BUSINESSES**) to bring items to the Borough that are difficult to dispose of. It's an opportunity for you to do some fall housecleaning and get rid of some of those items that you just don't know what to do with.

We will also accept Electronic Recycling items at the event as well. **This drop off event will be in lieu of the regularly scheduled E-Waste Drop Off in October.**

We will also accept tires and items containing freon.

Charges for items will be as follows:

- Household Items: No charge
- Electronics: No charge
- White goods (washer / dryer): No charge
- Tires: \$5 each
- Batteries (such as car batteries): \$5 each
- Items containing freon (such as dehumidifiers, air conditioners, refrigerators, freezers, etc): \$30 each

WHAT: Household Hazardous Waste Day

WHEN: Saturday, November 1st from 8:00 AM to 1:00 PM

WHERE: Emmaus Community Park

This is the event where you will be able to get rid of some of your household chemicals, oil, and paint. (We will not accept latex-based paint, as you can dry that out at home and throw it in the garbage. However, oil-based paint and other types of paint will be accepted). There are certain items that we will not accept, including mercury and several other items that will be outlined on our Facebook Page and / or Borough website.

Generally Accepted Items:

- Automotive Products, such as antifreeze, brake fluid, motor oil and filters, fuels, etc.
- Garden Chemicals, such as fertilizers, insect sprays, herbicides, pesticides, and weed killer
- Paint Products, such as chalk, glue, paint, stain, stripper, thinner, wood preservative
- Household Chemicals, such as ammonia, heavy-duty cleaners, naval jelly, tile remover, and strippers
- Universal Materials, such as batteries, compact fluorescent lamps (CFL), thermometers, fluorescent tubes

What is NOT Accepted:

- Ammunition, explosives, asbestos, or any material that is not in a labeled container or is leaking.
- Latex Paint – please do NOT put this in with your other chemicals, as it is not considered a hazardous waste item, and will only add cost to the event. We will take latex paint, only because we are looking for an outlet to donate it to, however, please separate this from the other paint or chemicals you may have.
- Mercury or other highly volatile substances that are extremely uncommon (at the discretion of the collection team)

The Police Department will also be on location with the medicine drop-off box for anyone that wants to drop off any of their old medicine as well. More details will follow for this event as well.

We will also distribute some educational material at the event regarding refuse, recycling, and hazardous waste reduction.

This event is open to BOROUGH RESIDENTS ONLY! This event is NOT designed for businesses.

How Do These Events Work?

A team of Borough employees, volunteers, Whitetail Disposal and several contracted hazardous waste haulers will be at the Emmaus Compost Site ready to help you dispose of your items. There will be multiple dumpsters on site. Each person will be directed to show their identification. If there is not a Borough resident in the vehicle, the vehicle will be turned away. Payment for different items, such as tires or freon items will be paid at this point, as a log and inventory of the general type of vehicles will be taken. Vehicles will be directed to dumpsters that are lined up, based on what is in the vehicle. We will have a dumpster for electronic waste, metal, multiple dumpsters for general waste, a dumpster for tires, and dumpsters for the hazardous waste. You might be required to assist in unloading your vehicle, however, our employees and volunteers will do their best to assist you as well. After you have unloaded your vehicle, you will be directed out the road. You are permitted to come back to the site as many times as you need to.

We encourage you to take advantage of the event and use it for some fall cleaning and to part ways with some of that paint or different chemicals that you haven't found a home for, as well as parting ways with that old couch or other stuff that's been sitting in storage for a long time. Please don't wait until the last minute to show up. We expect there to be lines and it will take time to get everyone through. We look forward to seeing you!

2025 Curbside Leaf Collection

Barring any complications with weather, equipment, or emergencies, Curbside Leaf Collection will begin on Monday, October 20, 2025. **The final day for collection will be Friday, December 5, 2025. All leaves must be to the curbline by 7:00 a.m. on Monday, December 1st to ensure pick up. Once the Public Works Department has made their final pass, they will not return. The Borough does not set specific days for leaf collection for individual streets.** It is recommended that leaves are raked out at the beginning of each week. Once the Public Works Department has made a pass through your street, they will not return until their next pass through. Please be advised that if the Borough encounters winter weather and must plow, any leaves in the road will be plowed. Every attempt will be made to clean the roads prior to winter. If there are low hanging branches overhanging the roadway, the Borough's leaf truck may not be able to pick up the leaves. Please make sure that all overhanging branches are trimmed prior to winter.

- Please rake all leaves to the curb into long narrow rows not more than 18" into the road. Leaves placed on the sidewalk will not be collected.
- The Public Works Department will not empty bags or other containers; this is the responsibility of the resident. Branches, shrubbery, grass, garbage, dog waste, and other building

materials will not be picked up. Piles with anything other than leaves will not be picked up. These objects will cause damage to the leaf pick-up truck and will put it out of service at a great expense of time and money for the Borough and its residents.

- Leaves will not be collected on private property. They must be placed at the curbline.
- Do not place tarps or any type of covering over your leaves. The Public Works Department will bypass them, and they will not be collected.
- Residents who have areas designated as "No Parking" (yellow painted curbs) are encouraged to pile leaves at these locations for easier pick up.
- To help facilitate the picking up of the leaves, please keep all vehicles away from the area where the leaves are piled. The Public Works Department will not rake piles of leaves out from between parked cars or from under them.
- Do not pile leaves on or around storm drains as this will cause flooding and create unsafe driving conditions.

Please do not place leaves out prior to the starting date! If you would like to remove your leaves prior to the start of leaf collection, you may drop your leaves off at the Compost Site located off of Klines Lane.

Compost Site Hours of Operation

Closed in observance of Holidays: November 11th

OPEN: March 17th to November 22nd

Monday and Friday: 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. (No Loading) • Wednesday, 7:30 a.m. to dusk (No Loading)

Saturdays: 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. (Loading until 3:30 p.m.)

The Compost Site will close for the season on Saturday, November 22nd but will reopen on Monday, December 8th through Friday, December 12th from 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. for additional leaf and yard waste drop-off.

We only accept organic yard waste. No lumber, root balls with dirt, garbage, dirt, building materials, etc. is allowed.

Unscreened compost, wood chip mulch, and screened compost is available for hand loading or a loading fee of \$25.00 per scoop or partial scoop. Only pick-ups or small trailers will be loaded.

Please have your Driver's License or Picture ID available upon request from the attendant. There will be no admittance without proper identification.

Call Before You Dig

If you are planning on digging, call Pennsylvania One Call System, Inc. (POCS) three business days before you dig at 1-800-242-1776 or 8-1-1. The call center is open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, every day of the year. PA Act 287 as amended requires excavators as well as private landowners to call POCS three days prior to any type of digging occurring with powered equipment. Mark your excavation area in white paint before calling with a dig notification.

By calling, you allow the facility owners the opportunity to locate and mark their underground facility in advance of the planned excavation (gas and liquid pipelines will mark underground facilities using yellow stakes, flags, or paint).

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Recycling Do's and Don'ts

DO

- ✓ **Rinse Containers:** Clean out any food or liquid residue from recyclable containers. This helps prevent contamination and ensures materials are properly recycled.
- ✓ **Break Down Boxes:** Flatten cardboard boxes to save space and make them easier to handle.
- ✓ **Follow Local Guidelines:** Each area has specific rules for what can and cannot be recycled. Familiarize yourself with the local recycling guidelines. Review the list of recyclable items below or visit www.whitetaildisposal.com/recycling/.
- ✓ **Place Loosely in a Lidded Bin:** Recyclables need to be loose and unbagged (garbage bags are not recyclable). The Emmaus Borough requires residents to place recyclables in a lidded container for collection. Whitetail Disposal asks that trash and recycling containers are placed wheels toward house for pick up.

DON'T

- ✗ **Don't Include Plastic Bags:** Plastic bags can clog recycling machinery. Use designated collection points at grocery stores for these items.
- ✗ **Don't Recycle Contaminated Items:** Items with food residue, grease (this includes pizza boxes), or hazardous waste should not be placed in the recycling bin. Contaminated recyclables end up in the landfill.
- ✗ **Don't Mix Non-Recyclables:** Avoid placing non-recyclable items such as electronics, batteries, and hazardous waste in your recycling bin.
- ✗ **Don't Assume Items Are Recyclable:** Review the list of items below. When in doubt, check the Whitetail Disposal website (whitetaildisposal.com) or call 610-936-9967. Trying to recycle non-recyclable items can contaminate the whole batch.

By following these guidelines, you can help reduce waste and ensure our recycling efforts are more effective and sustainable.

Items Accepted
✓ Paper: Newspapers, magazines, and office paper (unshredded) are recyclable.
✓ Cardboard: Unsoiled cardboard boxes are recyclable. Break down and flatten boxes when possible.
✓ Glass: Bottles and jars are generally recyclable as long as they are emptied and thoroughly rinsed clean.
✓ Metals: Aluminum cans, tin cans, steel cans, and foil are accepted if rinsed clean.
✓ Plastics: Bottles and containers labeled with recycling symbols #1–#7 are accepted if rinsed clean.

Items NOT Accepted
✗ Soiled Containers: Greasy food containers (e.g., pizza boxes) go in trash.
✗ Soiled Paper and Store Receipts: Shredded, wet, or soiled paper and store receipts clog the machine. Consider composting.
✗ Plastic Shopping Bags: Return these to designated collection points at stores.
✗ Plastic Wrap: Plastic wrap, bubble wrap, sandwich bags, and freezer bags can be reused or placed in trash.
✗ Flexible Bags or Coated Containers: Trash flexible food packaging (e.g., chip bags, juice pouches) and containers with a wax or plastic coating (e.g., to-go cups, milk cartons).
✗ Styrofoam: To-go cups and containers and packing peanuts are not accepted. Check for specialized recycling programs in your area.
✗ Electronics and Batteries: Use e-waste recycling programs or designated drop-off points.
✗ Hazardous Materials: Items such as paint, chemicals, or medical waste require special disposal methods.



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
