The Borough of Emmaus has had quite a year! Streets were torn up, and construction seemed to be everywhere! The Borough was able to pave more streets this year than we have in nearly two decades. After navigating several different types of feasibility studies, hydraulic tests, capacity studies, PA DEP permitting, engineering, and navigating through the process of obtaining grants, and financing the project, the Borough was able to finally put shovels to the ground on our PFAS mitigation project. We continued to invest in upgrades to the swimming pool and had a very successful season at the pool, despite flooding problems that closed the pool for several days. We suffered the loss of a past Chief of Police and a beloved firefighter and felt those losses tremendously. We promoted several of our Emergency Service personnel and hired new Police Officers. We hosted our ever-popular Dumpster Day and Household Hazardous Waste Day and enjoyed conversations with our residents at both events. We've had many great celebrations throughout the community this year, including our annual Halloween Parade, National Night Out, and Farewell to Summer Festival, and look forward to many more for years to come. As we look forward to 2026, we know we have many things that need to be accomplished, and we look forward to continuing to serve our great community.

There are many ways you can be involved in the new year, as we have numerous volunteer opportunities in the community. Volunteers, whether for the Borough or in our many great civic organizations, are what truly make our community so special. Many of the events in our community are organized and driven by volunteers. News from the Emmaus Veterans Committee



The Emmaus Veterans Committee consists of honorably discharged veterans who have served in any branch of the U.S. military. Most are also members of the Emmaus American Legion Post 191, the Marine Corps League Detachment 296, and the Emmaus Catholic War Veterans Post 1069. The organization is involved in and/or provides the following services.

- Provide the Honor Guard which renders military honors at veteran's funeral services. Any family of a veteran can request our Honor Guard service through the funeral director. There is no charge for the funeral service, but a donation will be accepted and appreciated since this is our major source of funds. Through September of 2025 we honored 41 veterans.
- Attend the annual Memorial Day Parade and ceremony at the Emmaus Veterans Memorial Triangle Park. This event was organized, funded, and presented by the Veteran's Committee with the assistance of Borough employees and Council members.
- Provide flag ceremonies for schools and other community events.
- The Honor Guard presents the Colors at the Borough of Emmaus Annual Flag Day Ceremony.
- Place flag at gravesite of veterans at local cemeteries prior to Memorial Day each year. Also Reflag worn and torn flags at cemeteries as necessary.
- Make monetary donations to veterans and to organizations that help veterans.

The Emmaus Veterans Committee is currently seeking new members to continue the work of the Committee and to participate in the Honor Guard. The Committee meets on the 2nd Wednesday in January, March, May, September, November, and December at 1:00 p.m. at Citizen's Fire Company #2, 1017 Pennsylvania Ave., Emmaus, PA. The atmosphere at Groceries PLUS is warm and welcoming. The pantry seeks to live out the "PLUS" in our name, which stands for prayer, love, understanding and support. Guests often come early to share a cup of coffee with a friend and to chat.

What do clients say while collecting food?

- You mean I get to choose my own food?
- Coming here was one of hardest things I've done. I felt ashamed and unworthy. As soon as I walked through the door, those feelings went away in the warm welcome I received.
- We're new to the area. My husband's studying and I haven't found work. This is a difficult season for us, but we'll get through it thanks, in part, to you.
- The pantry is organized so well.



Each month, Groceries PLUS gives away about 8,000 pounds of food; enough to fill about 500 grocery bags. This food then goes into the kitchens of about 130 households here in Emmaus.

You may wonder where all this food comes from. About half is donated by individuals, churches, civic groups and businesses in Emmaus. These donations come as actual food along with gift cards and financial gifts which we use to buy food from nearby stores.

Groceries PLUS distributes a monthly list of current needs, which you can get from Bethel Church (610 965 2682, press 1, or GroceriesPLUS@bethelBFC.org). You can also click the QR code to see the current needs in the form of an Amazon wish list.

What is the number one thing I can do to prevent infection as this fall/winter season approaches?

YOU GUESSED IT:

Handwashing with soap and water is simple and inexpensive, and it can significantly reduce the number of people who get sick. Studies show that handwashing education in the community can:

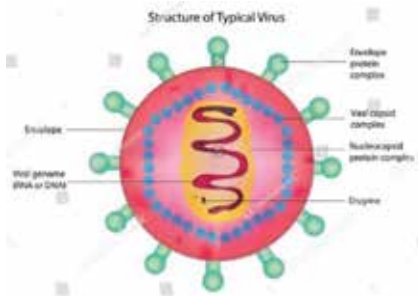
- Reduce the number of people who get sick with diarrhea by about 23%–40%.
- Reduce the number of school days children miss because of gastrointestinal illness by 29%–57%.
- Reduce diarrheal illness in people with weakened immune systems by about 58%.
- Reduce respiratory illnesses, like colds, in the general population by about 16%–21%.



FIGHTING GERMS IS OUR JOB:

In biology, a pathogen is any organism or agent that can produce disease. A pathogen may also be referred to as an infectious agent, or simply a germ.

Viruses can look like this:



Bacteria can look like this:



OTHER QUESTIONS YOU MAY HAVE???

Is hand washing with soap and water better than using hand sanitizers?

- YES, however, if soap and water are not available hand sanitizers are good to use. If you use a hand sanitizer, make sure it has at least 60% alcohol and wash your hands with soap and water as soon as you can.

Should I buy antibacterial soap or plain soap?

- Antibacterial soaps that you can buy without a prescription do not kill germs better than plain soaps. Some studies have shown that using antibacterial soap may contribute to antibiotic resistance (AR). Antibiotic resistance happens when germs like bacteria and fungi develop the ability to defeat the drugs designed to kill them. That means the germs are not killed and continue to grow. Infections caused by antibiotic-resistant germs are difficult, and sometimes impossible, to treat. AR has the potential to affect people at any stage of life, as well as the healthcare, veterinary, and agriculture industries. This makes it one of the world's most urgent public health problems. Keeping your hands clean by washing your hands with soap and water or using alcohol-based hand sanitizer is one of the best ways to prevent germs from spreading and avoid infections.

PARENTS, MAKE HANDWASHING FUN:

Have your kids sing Happy Birthday twice while they lather and wash their hands. This is, by far, the best way to keep kids from getting sick.

FOLLOW THESE STEPS WHEN WASHING YOUR HANDS:

- Wet your hands with clean, running water. The temperature of the water does not matter.
- Apply soap and lather well. The soap allows the bacteria and viruses to slide off your hands.
- Rub your hands hard for at least 20 seconds. Scrub all surfaces. This includes the backs of your hands, your wrists, between your fingers and under your fingernails.
- Rinse well.
- Dry your hands with a clean towel or air-dry them.

Are bacteria all bad?:

Bacteria are small single-celled organisms. Bacteria are found everywhere on Earth and are vital to the planet's ecosystems. Some species can live under extreme conditions of temperature and pressure. The human body is full of bacteria, and in fact is estimated to contain more bacterial cells than human cells.

- HAND-WASHING OFFERS GREAT REWARDS. IF YOU MAKE HAND-WASHING A HABIT, IT CAN PLAY A BIG ROLE IN KEEPING YOU HEALTHY.
- NATIONAL HAND WASHING DAY IS OCTOBER 13 - THIS IS A GOOD TIME TO REMIND FAMILY AND FRIENDS TO WASH THEIR HANDS AND STAY HEALTHY.

IT'S NOT TOO LATE TO GET A FLU SHOT: The CDC recommends getting vaccinated early, but they also say, "Getting vaccinated later, however, can still be beneficial and vaccination should continue to be offered throughout the flu season, even into January or later." So, it is never too late to get a flu vaccine.

Vehicle Tips

Home Tips

How does the Subscription work?

All emergency transports are billed to your insurance company. As a subscriber, if your insurance company does not pay anything towards the bill, you will receive a 50% discount of your co-pay. All subscribers will receive a 30% discount on all non-emergency transportation and refusal of services.

Who is eligible to become a subscriber of the Subscription program?

The program is designed to assist the residents of Emmaus Borough, Upper Milford, Salisbury and Lower Macungie Townships. The entire Lehigh Valley Region can benefit from the subscription program for non-emergency transports.

Are non-emergency transports covered by my subscription?

On transport not covered by most insurances (Wheelchair Van and Ambulette) you will receive a 30% discount off the fees charged.

Do I still need a subscription if I have health insurance?

Yes. A subscription will provide a discount on the balance of your bill. When medically necessary, ambulances are typically covered by insurance but there is a chance, after review of the claim by the insurance company, that the claim could be partially covered or denied. The subscriber would receive a discount in those situations.

Who qualifies for the Senior Household Membership?

To qualify for the Senior Household rate, at least one household member must be 65 or older.

Why should I subscribe?

Most insurance providers only pay a portion of the charges for ambulance services; your subscription guarantees that you will not be responsible for all of the outstanding balance.

Who is covered by the Emmaus Subscription?

Anyone who is a permanent resident in your household.

I have Medicare or Medicare HMO. Will a subscription benefit me?

If Medicare or Medicare HMO determines ambulance transportation was not medically necessary, the subscriber will only be responsible to pay the "allowable" amount that those insurances approved to be paid, not the full ambulance transportation charge.

What if I am a Medicaid Recipient?

By law, Medicaid (medical assistance) recipients are prohibited from participating in a subscription program.

I received a check from my insurance company for services rendered. What should I do with it?

You **MUST** forward reimbursement received from your insurance company to the billing company.

Is my subscription fee tax deductible?

NO, subscription fees are NOT tax deductible. Any additional donations you would make would be considered tax deductible.

Children Younger than 2 years: REAR-FACING Car Seats

- ✓ Always choose a car seat made for the child's age and size.
 - Read the car seat labels for the weight and height ranges.
 - **Secure children rear-facing as long as possible.**
- ✓ Install the car seat facing the rear of the vehicle.
- ✓ Choose a back seat.
 - Never secure the car seat in the front seat with an active front seat air bag.

- ✓ Adjust the harness to fit the child.
 - Harness straps are:
 - **At or below** the child's shoulder and snug.
 - Extra webbing cannot be pinched at the shoulder.
 - Chest clip placed at armpit level.
- ✓ Secure the car seat tightly.
 - Moves no more than one-inch when pulled where the seat belt goes through the car seat.
- ✓ Never leave a child alone in the car.



Children Ages 2 and Older: FORWARD-FACING Car Seats

Child is over age 2 AND has outgrown the weight or height limits of the rear-facing car seat.

- ✓ Always choose a car seat made for the child's age and size.
 - Read the labels for the car seat weight and height ranges.
 - **Secure children forward-facing until the child outgrows the harness.**
- ✓ Install the car seat facing the front of the vehicle.
- ✓ Choose a back seat.
 - Recommended to not to secure the car seat in the front seat with an active front seat air bag.

- ✓ Adjust the harness to fit the child.
 - Harness straps are:
 - **At or above** the child's shoulder and snug.
 - Extra webbing cannot be pinched at the shoulder.
 - Chest clip placed at armpit level.
- ✓ Secure the car seat tightly.
 - Moves no more than one-inch when pulled where the seat belt goes through the car seat.
- ✓ Attach and secure the tether to limit forward movement in the event of a crash.

Helpful Hints from the Emmaus Fire Department



As temperatures drop, many families turn to space heaters, fireplaces, candles, and holiday lights to keep warm and festive. Unfortunately, winter is also the peak season for home fires. Practicing fire safety can help protect your loved ones and your home during the colder months.

Common Winter Fire Hazards

- **Space Heaters:** Keep them at least three feet away from anything that can burn. Always turn them off before leaving the room or going to bed.
- **Fireplaces & Wood Stoves:** Use a sturdy screen to stop sparks, and have chimneys cleaned annually.
- **Candles:** Never leave them unattended and keep them away from curtains or decorations. Consider battery-operated alternatives.
- **Holiday Lights:** Inspect cords for frays and avoid overloading outlets.
- **Avoid Touching Trees Near Power Lines:** Heavy snow and ice can cause branches to fall onto lines. Don't try to remove them yourself. Call the power company or 911.

Another Successful Dumpster Day

The Borough hosted Dumpster Day on October 4th at the Compost Site. The day is designed for our residents to throw out some of the junk that perhaps has been gathering in the garage, shed or in the house. The event, over the years, has been extremely successful, as several hundred cars come to drop off everything from electronics to batteries to tires to couches. This year's event saw 242 vehicles come through the line. Among items that were dropped off, there were two large box trucks packed with electronics, over 60 tires, 13 batteries, and 25 different items containing freon. In addition, residents disposed of old furniture, and different household waste items. Members of our administrative staff, public works department, police department, and fire department all partnered with Whitetail Hauling to ensure the success of the event.



While the results aren't in for our Household Hazardous Waste Day on November 1st, we anticipate another outstanding event. Our next Dumpster Day and HHW Day will be in 2028, as we hold them every other year. Please note, if you have any bulk items to dispose of at your home, you can call our waste hauler, Whitetail Disposal, to schedule curbside pick-up.

PFAS Project Construction Continues



As you are aware, the Borough has been working as quickly as possible on the PFAS mitigation project. The large project began construction over Summer and will continue through next Spring. The project is scheduled to have substantial completion finished by the end of March, with the final completion in June.

As of the middle of October, the large underground equalization tank was completed and the footers for the tank storage building were being poured. Throughout the months of November and December, the building will be constructed. In January, the large carbon tanks will be delivered, as the delivery of the tanks was delayed from November. There will be 4 tanks that are over 20 feet high and 12 feet in diameter. Over the next few months, the system will be constructed inside the building. Once the weather begins to break in early Spring, the final plumbing and well rebuilds will occur, and the system will be ready to go online. The project's final cost came in at \$9,731,255 million. The Borough Manager obtained a Penn Vest grant in the amount of \$7,762,036 and a loan in the amount of \$1,633,964 to fund the project.



Our last PFAS readings from the 2 wells that are being treated were about 1100 parts per trillion for one well. That well was turned offline as soon as PFAS was discovered, meaning water was no longer disbursed from that well. The reading on the other well was a combined 133 parts per trillion of PFOA and PFOS.

The Water Well Tank Rehab Project continued throughout the Summer and early fall. The project is essential to maintaining the life expectancy of the holding tanks at each of Borough's wells, as well as the main tanks that distribute water into the Borough. The project, costing nearly \$2 million to complete, consists of sandblasting, patching, and repairing the inside and outside of each of the holding tanks, including repainting each tank. Special technology, chemical treatments, patching, and rehabilitation efforts were used to repair and extend the life of two of our well tanks as well as our 1.2 million gallon holding tank this year. Next year, we will complete the final holding tank and our 1-million-gallon tank. The project is mostly funded by a \$1.2 million ARPA H2O grant obtained by our Borough Manager. Because of the repairs and ongoing maintenance plan, we can expect the life expectancy of each of the tanks to last another 50 years. To replace a single holding tank, the price is expected to reach over \$4 million in today's dollars, therefore, the efforts to make repairs now are essential to prevent having to incur that cost in the near future. Curbside Leaf Collection

The Borough of Emmaus will continue its 2025 Curbside Leaf Collection through Friday, December 5th. The Borough is unable to set specific pickup dates for leaf collection for individual streets. We recommend that you have them raked out at the beginning of each week. Once the Public Works Department has made a pass through your street, they will not return until the following pick up. Please be advised that if the Borough encounters winter weather and must plow, any leaves in the road will be plowed. Every attempt will be made to clean the roads prior to winter. For FINAL COLLECTION please have your leaves out by Monday morning December 1st. Once we have made our final pass on your street, we will not return.



- Please rake all leaves to the curb into long narrow rows not more than 18" into the road. Leaves placed on the sidewalk will not be collected.
- The Public Works Department will not empty bags or other containers; this is the responsibility of the residents. Branches, shrubbery, grass, garbage, dog waste, and any other building materials will not be picked up. Piles with anything other than leaves will not be picked up. These objects will cause damage to the leaf pickup units and put them out of service at a great expense of time and money to the Borough and its residents.
- Leaves will not be collected on private property. They must be placed at the curblane. If leaves are not in place when the crews go by, they will be picked up on the following round through the Borough. No "return trips" will be made to pick them up.
- Residents who have areas designated as "No Parking" (yellow painted curbs) are encouraged to pile leaves at these locations for easier pick up.
- Do not place tarps over your leaves. The Public Works Department will bypass them, and they will not be collected.
- To help facilitate the collection of leaves, please keep all vehicles away from the area where the leaves are piled. The Public Works Department will not rake piles of leaves out from between parked cars or from under them.
- Do not pile leaves on or around storm drains as this will cause flooding issues and create unsafe driving conditions.

Thank you for your cooperation. For additional leaf/yard waste disposal, the Compost Site is also open for drop-off Monday, December 8th through Friday, December 12th from 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

Compost Site Hours of Operation

The Compost Site will close for the season on **Saturday, November 22nd** but will reopen on **Monday, December 8th** through **Friday, December 12th** from 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. for additional leaf and yard waste drop off.

Christmas Tree Collection

The Public Works Department will collect Christmas trees placed at the curbline beginning on **Friday, January 5th, 2026 through Friday, January 9th, 2026**. Please place your natural tree at the curb, WITHOUT A BAG, ORNAMENTS, TINSEL/GARLAND, LIGHTS, or TREE STANDS. The Public Works Department will not collect artificial trees placed at the curb. The Borough's refuse collection company, Whitetail Disposal, does not collect trees placed at the curb. Trees discarded after January 9th, 2026 will not be picked up. After January 10th, residents must take their tree to the Compost Site for Disposal. The Compost Site will be open January 12th – 16th from 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. for disposal of Christmas trees and other yard waste (no loading)

Some examples of permits that the Borough of Emmaus requires are roof repairs, building repairs or remodels (causing structural changes), footers, foundation, framing, plumbing, electrical, signs, fences, sheds, dumpsters, demolition, driveways, pools, and zoning.

A moving permit is required for any individual or family moving in, out, or within the Borough. The permit application can be obtained from the Cashier at Town Hall, 28 S. 4th Street, or by visiting the Borough website at: www.emmauspa.gov. Snow Plowing Tips and Reminders



The Public Works Department of the Borough of Emmaus is dedicated to the safety of its residents. At times, snow removal can be a monumental task and our Department of Public Works employees work around the clock to keep the State and Borough routes open. To prepare our residents for impending snowstorms, the Public Works Department wants you to know more about snow removal and answer your most frequently asked questions.

- 1. When will my street be plowed?** Depending on the severity of the snowstorm, roads that will be plowed first are: the roads with the highest traffic volume, steep hills, state roads, snow emergency routes, roads near emergency service facilities, and roads near public institutions. While the storm is occurring, one pass is made in each direction of every street. After this is complete, or it is determined that the storm is coming to an end, the pushing back phase of the excess snow will begin. This is when all streets are cleaned curb-to-curb or to the shoulder of the road.
- 2. Should we move our cars from the street?** When a storm is forecasted, move vehicles to off-street parking when possible and keep vehicles off the street until plowing is completed. Parked cars can cause both a hazard and hindrance to snow removal efforts. This allows plows to clear the entire roadway the first time through, making return trips unnecessary.
- 3. What about driveways and sidewalks?** When cleaning your street, the crews have no place to push the snow except to the side of the road. This creates the unavoidable problem of already cleaned sidewalks and driveways to be covered with snow. Residents and business owners should wait until the Borough trucks and equipment have completed their work before cleaning driveways, sidewalks, and vehicles. Snow from vehicles and sidewalks should not be deposited back into that portion of the street where snow has already been removed. Do not shovel snow from your driveways into the roadway. This practice is illegal under the state motor vehicle code and Borough Ordinance 303 and is also hazardous. Fines for violations range from \$25.00 to \$100.00. **Please do not shovel snow into the street!** Residents are responsible for the actions of anyone they may hire for removal.
- 4. If the Borough pushes snow back onto my sidewalk, who is responsible?** Sidewalks are the responsibility of the property owner. Borough Ordinance 302 requires that all sidewalks must be cleared of snow or ice accumulations within twenty-four (24) hours after each precipitation ends. Failure to do so may result in fines for violations of the Ordinance. School bus stops must also be kept clear of snow and ice on the sidewalks.
- 5. What if my mailbox becomes covered with snow?** Your mailbox and the access to it, for the U.S. Postal Service, is the responsibility of the resident. Again, because the crews have no place to put the snow, roadside mailboxes may become blocked. Heavy snow may damage mailboxes. This is not intentional but may occur. Please make sure your mailbox is sturdy and in good repair. The Borough will not be responsible for repairs to mailboxes placed within the legally defined rights-of-ways of its roads unless they are struck by the snow removal equipment.
- 6. What should I do if my lawn or landscaping was damaged by the snowplow?** Any objects that are placed within the right-of-way by the property owner, including trees, shrubs or lawns are not the responsibility of the Borough in the case of plow damage. If there are low hanging branches overhanging the roadway, the Borough's plows or emergency vehicles will not be able to make a clear pass through. Those areas may not be plowed, and emergency vehicles may not have access. Please make sure that all overhanging branches are trimmed prior to winter.

Weather and snowstorms require patience. Neighborhoods and businesses should work together. If practical, develop plans ahead of time in relation to where snow and ice will be stored. Contractors with plow equipment and residents with snow blowers should remain mindful of the direction snow and ice is removed from properties. Remember, we are all trying to achieve the same goal of keeping our roadways safe and traffic moving. During snowstorms, SAFETY is the Borough's main concern.

PLEASE HAVE PATIENCE! Snow removal is tedious and a very time-consuming job. The Borough of Emmaus Public Works snow removal operators are human and work many hours under very difficult conditions to keep Borough residents safe. Please do not abuse them or threaten them or the Borough of Emmaus Police Department may be contacted. Travel should be limited during a snowfall and immediately after, unless absolutely necessary. Please do not call unless it is urgent! When crews are removed from normal routes, it slows down the overall efforts. If a call warrants attention, the information will be dispatched, and the crew will take care of the problem as soon as possible.

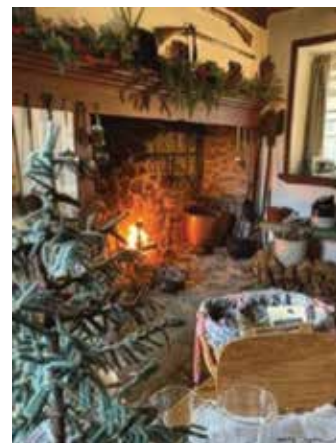

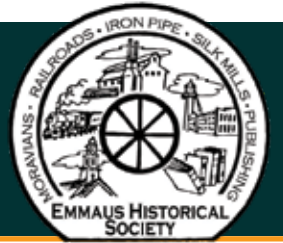

Celebrating Traditions in Emmaus

One of the things that keeps our families and community ties strong is tradition. Many of you can fondly recall stories of holidays past—moments filled with laughter, warmth, and cherished customs. Hopefully, those traditions continue to thrive in your homes today.

The community of Emmaus is no different. Beginning in the 1920s, Santa Claus would appear at Town Hall on Christmas morning, handing out oranges and chocolates to the children of Emmaus. The event drew large crowds, with lines winding down the block. In later years, the tradition was carried on by various fire companies and continued into the 1960s. How many of you remember receiving your orange and chocolate from Santa?

In 1923, the first Christmas tree was placed in the empty Triangle on Christmas Eve, accompanied by music from the Moravian trombone choir. When the Triangle was renovated in 1960, an evergreen was planted—becoming a beloved centerpiece of Emmaus's holiday celebrations for decades.

Santa and Mrs. Claus made their first appearance in the 1950s. Mousey and Blub Gerhart visited Christmas parties at private homes throughout Emmaus on Christmas Eve. Blub also rode the firetruck to the Triangle, portraying Santa Claus for the Tree Lighting ceremony, which featured a small tree and a nativity scene. He was a familiar face at the Emmaus Kiwanis Club Christmas parties as well. Nancy and Franklin Reimert later took on the roles of Santa and Mrs. Claus, becoming fixtures at the Tree Lighting celebration and continuing the tradition until the mid-2010s. There's even a tale of Santa peeking out from the tower of the original Town Hall, where the fire whistle was housed—a memory that surely brings a smile.

These stories may stir fond memories of early Christmases in Emmaus—and the traditions continue today.



The Emmaus Historical Society kicks off the holiday season the first weekend of December. The Members' Wine and Cheese Social takes place on December 5th—a newer tradition that has quickly become a favorite. On Saturday, December 6th, Emmaus hosts its Old-Fashioned Christmas, offering something for everyone. Emmaus Main Street Partners sponsor events in which the Historical Society proudly participates, including the Cheers Trail (12–5 PM) and Candy Cane Lane (12–4 PM).

The Museum will be beautifully decorated with vintage holiday items donated by community members. One of the borough's only public train putz displays will be featured and enjoyed by visitors of all ages. The Museum will be open from 10:00 AM to 8:30 PM on December 6th. Emmaus's historic landmarks—the Shelter House, Knauss Homestead, and the 1803 House—will also be open for tours. And of course, the evening culminates with the arrival of Mr. and Mrs. Claus and the Tree Lighting in the Triangle.

On December 17th, the Emmaus Historical Society will host its Annual Christmas Party at St. John's Lutheran Church's Fellowship Hall—a joyful gathering to close out the season.

Our community is rich in tradition and history, and the Emmaus Historical Society is proud to preserve and celebrate it. We invite you to join us!

Looking ahead to the new year, the Society will not hold a Membership Meeting or Program in January, but mark your calendars for February 19th, the first program of 2026. Plans for the year's programs are still being finalized, and we'll also be sharing details about upcoming bus trips and events for the America250 Celebration. There's much to look forward to!

Winter Stormwater Tips

As winter approaches and rain turns to snow, it is still important to consider stormwater pollution. Pollutants such as soaps, fertilizers, automotive fluids, and pet waste can be collected in the snowpack, accumulating until a thaw suddenly dumps them into the storm water system. Contaminants that end up in the storm drains are carried off, untreated, to streams and larger bodies of water that are used for drinking, swimming, or fishing.

Here are a few helpful habits to help reduce the number of harmful pollutants entering storm drains this winter season:

- **Winterizing vehicles.** Check that your car is not leaking oil or other fluids. It takes only a small amount of motor oil to pollute thousands of gallons of water. Also, dispose of drained fluids properly. Many service stations, and the Borough during Household Hazard Waste Day, will collect used motor oil and recycle it. Please do not dump these items down the storm drains.
- **Washing vehicles.** On a warm winter day, you may be tempted to break out the hose and bucket to get some of the road grime off of your car. Take a moment to see where that runoff is going. Does it wash down the driveway and into the storm drain? If so, all that salt and dirt will enter a stream or pond. Using a car wash facility may cost a few dollars more, but the water will be treated before being released into the watershed.
- **De-icing driveways and sidewalks.** While it may be habit to stock up on salt for the winter, many people would not consider dumping a bucket of salt on their lawn in the summer. But the results are similar. Salt runs off your sidewalk and onto the surrounding soil. Consider more environmentally friendly deicing products like Rain-Ex, Enviro-MLT, or Easy Melt found at most auto parts and home improvement stores.
